A Message from the President



Welcome to the New Year! Over the past year, I have spoken to many of you regarding how the Association can be more responsive to your needs. In April of 2011, the association was invited to take part in a membership survey to assess your professional development needs. There were 36 respondents which included 26 Program Representatives, one Academic Coordinator, and nine Advisors. One hundred percent of respondents were willing to participate in professional development training. 64 percent preferred mini-workshops of one hour and 61 percent preferred receiving professional development training by our own 4-H staff. Half

of the respondents preferred separating training by staff position and half preferred both online and face-to-face training. 83 percent of respondents preferred professional development training in research areas of design and reporting of data, while 61 percent preferred professional development training in communication areas of social media.

In order to communicate the Association's activities, we have created a quarterly newsletter and Facebook page. I have asked Mandi Bottoms to be our newsletter editor. She may contact you from time to time asking for information or wanting an article to showcase your programming. However, this newsletter is in need of an appropriate name. 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Relevant Research

What is American identity? How does a wavering sense of American identity among today's youth impact our nation? Research findings reveal young Americans that are prone to distance themselves from their role as American citizens (Andolina et al, 2002), not be proud of their American citizenship, and disinterested in politics (Levine, 2007). American identity is an important aspect of youth development, relating directly to youth civic development and engagement.

A recent article featured in *Applied Developmental Science*, *America as a Philosophy: Implications for the Development of American Identity Among Today's Youth* raises some interesting questions about fostering a sense of civic responsibility. With citizenship as a significant component of how we deliver positive youth development in the context of 4-H, staff and volunteers alike have an essential role to play in connecting youth to their communities, country and world. Malin summarizes that national identity goes through a formative process that is shaped and influenced by experiences and interactions with American society. One way to engage youth in their communities is through service-learning. The launch of the 4-H Revolution of Responsibility campaign encourages a "movement of positive change in every county across California." The University of California 4-H Youth Development Program will be awarding 1,000 grants to support service-learning projects and empower youth to be change agents within their communities.
