Eligibility	 Applicant land managers¹ own between <u>20 and 5000</u> <u>acres</u> of non-industrial private forest lands in California zoned as compatible with forest management. Land manager must agree to a <u>deed restriction</u> to keep land in compatible use for at least 10 years Licensed cannabis growers may apply. 	 Applicant land managers must have an annual <u>income less than \$900,000</u> AGI. <u>No acreage limitations</u> apply Land managers must agree to keep land in compatible use up to 10 years, but <u>no</u> deed restriction is required. Lessees who prove land control may also apply. Cannabis growers are <u>not eligible</u> to apply.
Cost-share Provided	 <u>75% cost-share</u> for treatment activity costs that have been <u>predetermined at a capped rate</u>. The actual cost of implementing activities may exceed these capped rates. Land managers within designated disadvantaged communities, land managers with <500 acres, or those whose forest lands have been impacted by fire, may receive advance payments <u>and 90% cost-share rate</u>. Land managers must pay contractors up-front and show proof of payment; reimbursement expected <u>up to 120 days</u> following project completion. 	 Flat rate per acre incentive payments determined by treatment activity regardless of actual project cost. Total cumulative incentives provided are limited to \$450,000 per Farm Bill. Reimbursement expected within two week of project completion.
Prerequisites	 CFIP applications and environmental evaluation must be completed by a <u>RPF² contracted by the land</u> <u>manager</u>. Land managers may not submit an application without a RPF. An approved forest management plan (FMP) or non- industrial timber management plan (NTMP) is <u>required</u> to apply for implementation work. However, CFIP can simply be used to write a FMP. 	 EQIP applications are prepared with land managers for free by NRCS staff. <u>No outside contracted RPF</u> <u>is needed</u>. An environmental evaluation will be prepared by a NRCS natural resource professional. Forest management plans may be required on larger acreages. Based on staffing NCRS may be able to prepare a brief FMP for smaller projects/ownerships.
Program Requirements	 Participating land managers are responsible for <u>hiring</u> <u>a RPF</u>, obtaining proper permitting, and contracting out for project implementation. Land managers may complete their own work, but program cost-share rates will be lower. Spotted owl activity centers within one mile of project area trigger operating restrictions. Archaeology records search and survey are required at <u>land manager's expense</u>. CEQA exemptions can be applied to forest lands burned over by fire. Implemented projects must be ≥ 5 <u>acres</u>. 	 NRCS provides <u>free technical assistance</u> by natural resource professionals. The land manager is responsible for obtaining all necessary permits and contracting out for project implementation. Land manager may complete their own work at same cost-share rate as if contracting out work. <u>Mandatory operating restrictions</u> from Feb 1st - July 31st for spotted owl and migratory bird protection unless surveys exist or are completed. Archaeology records search and survey <u>completed by NRCS staff</u>.

Notable Benefits	 CFIP provides greater cost-share funding for the development of <u>forest management plans</u>. Land manager/RPF have <u>greater control over</u> <u>timeline</u> for environmental review. 	 EQIP provides a greater range of management activities for habitat enhancement. EQIP provides free technical assistance by an engineer for roadwork.
