Wild Horse Field Trip

On 10/20/12, we had a 4-H field trip to the Wild Horse and Burro Corrals in Litchfield, CA. We learned the history of horses and at one time they were the size of dogs. We learned that Wild Horse Annie got a law passed to quit killing wild horses. We learned about the different breeds and colors of the horses, and about why the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) freeze-brands horses and what the numbers on their necks mean.


We learned that there is not enough feed and water on the range to take care of the horses, so they have to be gathered and adopted to people. We played a game called Survival of the Fittest that showed us how hard it is to get feed and water. We also learned that the Devils Garden has the biggest amount of wild horses of any National Forest in the United States!

They had a horse named “Blue” that we all got to pet. They also showed us how the feed the horses with a tractor and a wagon.

We had lots of fun and learned a lot. We hope to go back next year and hope a lot more people will come so that can learn what we did

- The term “mustang” originates from the Spanish “mesteno”. Mesteno is a stray or ownerless horse.

Did you know?

The Modoc National Forest manages more wild horses than any National Forest in the nation. About 1,000 wild horses currently live on the 280,000 acre Devils Garden Plateau Wild Horse Territory.

Looking for a recreational activity for your next 4-H Club Meeting? **Conduct your own Wild Horse Roundup!**

- Find a large area where you can run. Examples might be a gym, parking lot, or play ground.
- Have participants count off beginning with “1” through “5” (be sure to get adults to participate too) .
- “1’s” get to be WILD HORSES.
- “2’s, 3’s, 4’s and 5’s” get to be FOOD.
- Have WILD HORSES (“1’s”) line up on one side of the activity area.
- Have FOOD (“2’s-5’s”) line up on the other side of the activity area facing the WILD HORSES.
- At the signal GO, WILD HORSES need to run and bring back ONE FOOD with them to the “1” line.
- “2’s-5’s” that are brought back to the “1” line, become WILD HORSES.
- Now repeat. At the signal GO, 1’s need to run back to the remaining “2’s-5’s” and bring back food to the “1” line.
- Continue until there is little or no food or remaining.
- What did you discover?
 - Did the number of wild horses remain the same throughout the game or did the number change?
 - What do you think will happen to the wild horses when they run out of food?
 - How might this apply to wild horses who depend on the food provided by public rangelands?
 - Would removing excess wild horses before they run out of food make a difference?



The Benefits of Including Educational Components in the 4-H Program By Dr. Cyndi Barnett, 4-H Program Advisor

John Dewey, a renowned educational philosopher, believed that learning should involve active movement. In other words, the knowledge we can needs to be based on direct experiences. Moreover, experiential learning is learning through reflection on doing, which is often contrasted with rote or didactic learning (i.e., lecture).

The 4-H SET Initiative is based on the *National Science Education Standards* (1996). The *Standards* outline the content and processes students or members need to know, understand, and be able to do to be scientifically literate. In addition, these processes and abilities unify science disciplines and provide youth with powerful ideas to help them understand the natural world.

Science education also needs to be grounded in inquiry-based learning. In this setting, youth build understanding through active exploration and posing questions that help them seek the answers to the problems they are solving. This is why we must facilitate learning instead of disseminating knowledge or giving the answers. This is often the outcome when young people are taught by testing.

Learning science is not about memorization. Engaging youth and motivating them to learn science content through hands-on learning processes is key to the success of young people being successful in building their knowledge levels. The 4-H Youth Development Program follows the four essential elements that are belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity. The follow the theme of this column, I want to give you the definition of mastery. It reads “4-H offers opportunities to take on new challenges and learn new skills. The presence of self-confidence and positive self-esteem are today considered to be two of the most important indicators of personal wellness and success in an individual.” As we get our footing into this new year of the 4-H program, think of ways to enhance the learning your members will embrace rather than telling them the answers or testing their knowledge. Remember, be the best you can be for 4-H!

You may be thinking: “Yay! I just finished my 2012 4-H Record Book and I don’t need to think about it again until next year.” But have you heard the old saying “don’t put off until tomorrow things you should do today”?

Good record-keeping is one of those things —and 4-H Online Record Book is a tool you can use to make the job easier and fun! Even better is the polished and professional look your 2013 4-H Record Book will have when you print it! Here’s how:

- ◆ You will need a computer with internet access and a web browser such as Internet Explorer.
- ◆ Ask your parents to go to <https://california.4honline.com> and log into their 4hOnln account.
- ◆ If your family doesn’t already have a password, click on the radio button, “I forgot my password,” and 4hOnline will email a password to you. (*Note: youth enrollment records must be entered into 4hOnline before access to Online Record Book is possible.*)
- ◆ Once logged into 4hOnline, your parents will need to set a Record Book password by clicking “Change Youth Password for Recordbooks.” This will set a separate password that you can use to access 4-H Online Record Book. (*Note: All youth members within the family account share the same Online Record Book password.*)
- ◆ Go to www.ca4h.org/4hbook/ and click “Youth Login”. Enter the record book password set by your parents.
- ◆ Enter information into your Online Record Book each time you participate in project, community club, county, regional or state meetings, events and activities. Enter project income and expenses.
- ◆ Online Record Book will automatically calculate the percent of club or project meetings you have attended and total your income and expenses.
- ◆ At the end of the year, print a copy of your Personal Development Report, Annual Project Reports and Teen/Junior Leader Reports.

On Your Mark, Get Set!

Prepare a Winning Presentation for 2013 Modoc County 4-H Presentation Day

Want to knock it out of the park with your presentation at the 2013 Modoc County 4-H Presentation Day? Follow these suggestions and you will hit a home run!

- **Pick a SUBJECT...**what is something you are really interested in and want to share with others? Then **NARROW DOWN** the subject...to a specific topic or process.
- **Identify WHY you are giving the presentation...**is it to inform, teach facts, motivate others to take action, provoke thought, or show a process?
- **OUTLINE your presentation...**
 - * **INTRODUCTION...**SPARK their curiosity.
 - * **BODY...**tell them and show them the three main points of your talk.
 - * **CONCLUSION...**summarize the main points and close with a comment to make your presentation memorable.
- **DEVELOP A TITLE...**that grabs attention, captures the purpose of your presentation and is short and to the point (4 to 5 words).
- **PREPARE YOUR MATERIALS...**use poster board or other materials to illustrate the main points of your presentation. Check your visual before you use it—is it easy to see and read from the back of the room?
- **PRACTICE your presentation...**how will you set up your workspace? How will you handle the materials you plan to show? Where will you place them when you set them down? Try to anticipate questions that may come up and find answers to those questions. **Then PRACTICE again and again!**



Example

Title: Leaf These Plants Alone

Introduction: One of the most common problems people have when hiking in the wilderness is that they are unable to distinguish between plants that are poisonous and nonpoisonous. For example, how often have you heard stories about people who sat down on a patch of poison oak? Today, I am going to show you how to identify three common poisonous plants. Once you can identify these plants, you will be able to avoid them and enjoy your visits to the wilderness.

Body: Tell them the three main points of your talk.

Three common poisonous plants are:

1. Poison Oak
2. Stinging Nettle
3. Oleander

Show the plants as you talk.

1. Three types of poison oak are:
2. Three characteristics of nettles are:

Conclusion: A close encounter with three common poisonous plants, poison oak, stinging nettle and oleander, can take all the fun out of your wilderness adventure. Now that you have learned how to identify these plants, you will be able to avoid them and put the fun back into your next wilderness visit.

Lettering for Posters and Charts

- **Keep it easy to read...**use the same fonts... place text so it can be read from left to right across the page.
- **Limit the use of UPPERCASE letters to titles and headings.**
- **Use lettering that is at least 1 1/2" in height ...**it will be easier to read from a distance.
- **Use geometric shapes, capital letters, italics and/or color to add emphasis.**
- **Use the text of your poster board illustrations as an outline.** Limit the text to a few **KEY WORDS...**say more than you show.


Rule of “3’s”

- * **Use three main ideas per chart when possible.**
- * **Limit your presentation to three main ideas.**
- * **Speak in threes and people remember more.**

Demonstrations and Illustrated Talks

- Teach a skill by the show-how method.
- Use posters and visual aids. Posters should include a title, three main points (body) and a summary.
- Range in length from 3—15 minutes depending on your age and the topic.
- Given by Individuals or Teams of up to 3 Members.

Educational Display

- Choose between a tri-fold card table display or a panel display.
- Include a title, your name, 4-H Club, and use visuals and lettering to illustrate the program or concept.
- Introduce your display. Share the title, how it is relevant to your 4-H experience and give an overview.

Prepared Speech

- Write and deliver a speech that will persuade, inform, or educate the audience on a single issue or topic.
- Range in length from 2-5 minutes.
- No props, costumes or visual aids allowed.

Share the Fun

- A 10-15 minute group skit or other presentation on health, safety, community pride, recreation, citizenship or other 4-H activity.
- Costumes, props, decorations, and other visual aids are encouraged.
