



Entries must be received no later than 4:00 pm **February 11, 2015** at the 4-H office 202 west 4th St in Alturas. Members may only participate in project you're enrolled in.

Cost:

22 rifle \$ 20.00 Shotgun: \$ 30.00

Required Equipment:

Rifle and shot gun only, Each participant must bring their own approved firearm or make other arrangements, safety glasses, ear protection, ammo (1box of 50, 22 LR 40 gr sp) 2 boxes of shotgun ammo shot size #7 $\frac{1}{2}$ or #8 20 or 12 gage no high base.

RULES:

- Any unsafe actions around firearms can and will result in dismissal, **NO horse play**.
- All firearms shall be unloaded and in a case when brought to range line.
- Be polite and courteous to your peers, leaders, parents, range master and others.
- Must be enrolled in the Modoc 4-H shooting sports program year 14/15
- Open sight, iron peep sight, telescope sight only, no scope shot guns will be allowed.
- No more than 5 practice shots will be allowed at each position (rifle). 6 shots will be fired at competition target (rifle), 25 (shotgun)

Top three in each division will win prizes top shot in each division will compete for over all top shot prize. (Rifle and shotgun are separate prize pool).

4-H Shooting Sports Workshop – Archery



If you have an interest in sharing your archery skills with youth, how about becoming a 4-H Archery adult volunteer or teen leader. There will be a 4-H archery leader certification training Saturday, January 24th, 10 AM – 4 PM, and Sunday, January 25th, 8 AM- 12 noon, at the Mount Shasta Rod & Gun Club Building, Mt. Shasta City Park.

This class is being hosted by Siskiyou County 4-H. You must be/become a 4-H leader or member and attend both days to receive certification to teach archery at the project, club and camp levels. The course will include a PowerPoint lecture, review of equipment, practice shooting and teaching, and a written test. The cost is \$20 per person to include a resource binder, Saturday lunch and Saturday and Sunday morning snacks/refreshments.

Junior and teen leaders are invited but must attend with an adult or have a certified archery adult leader they will be helping back home. If you are already a certified volunteer archery leader and would like to become a trainer, contact Jeanne at 530-524-7278 or email mtlassenlover@gmail.com to discuss options.
