COOL SEASON GARDENS FOR NAPA COUNTY

Plant in the Fall and early Spring. Harvest dates depend on weather and continue until hot weather comes. Seeds need soil temperatures of about 65° F to germinate. For spring planting, seeds should be started indoors 6 to 8 weeks prior to planting out in the garden. Transplant seedlings into the garden when they have two to four leaves. Warm soil conditions favor growth. Plants will tolerate some frost, but growth will stop until weather warms. See references for cultural practices. Cool season vegetables have seeds that germinate at cooler temperatures and develop smaller plants with shallower roots than warm season vegetables. Most respond to nitrogen and phosphorous fertilizers. Make repeated plantings for continuous harvest.
