# **Bee Project Community Service Project** *By Sanika Puranik, Rolling Hills 4-H Club*

On December 19<sup>th</sup>, 2009, the 4H Rolling Hills Bee Project set out to solve a problem and do community service to enhance Mc Clellan Ranch. The problem is the lack of native plants. These plants also help the bee project because they will help attract bees, needed for honey. The solution? A native plant habitat restoration project at McClellan Ranch.

Barbara Banfield explained why we needed native plants. These plants would attract native bees. Not only that, but once established they will become drought resistant. Since the plants are being planted in

their natural soil, they are adapted to it and require less water, a definite PRO considering California's severe drought. The types we planted were golden-rod, yarrow, buckwheat, asters, and toeynoes.

In the past decade or so, native plants have been ripped from the soil and replaced with buildings, recreational areas, and schools. What many people don't realize is, these plants are important members of our food chain. Animals, such as bees, are naturally attracted to the blossoms. When the plants go away so do the bees, with no bees, no pollination to other plants.

While there are countless advantages of native plants, none are put in effect unless planted properly with full protection. Unfortunately, our plant's new home was also residence of gophers, and an occasional grazing site for deers, squirrels, and other plant eating animals. Also, we had to give the plants sufficient space to grow, providing spacious holes.

However, those perils are put to sleep with a bit of math and cages made of wire. Our plot of land was large enough so that we could space the plants two feet apart, and carve the holes two times as wide and deep as the pot itself. Although, that in itself was a challenge due to the various roots, and rocks nestled into the tough dirt. Several shovel scoops, and pick hammers later, we were left with a beautiful round hole.

The plants we had were newly shipped, and relatively young. Also, they were in the type of containers that requires gentle tapping and sometimes squeezing to slowly ease the plant out of its plastic prison. This step is extremely important, as to not break off the roots or damage them in any way. We then placed the plants in the ground, and covered the roots. As previously mentioned, one of the worries was plant destroying animals. Homemade cages made of wire were snuggly tucked into the soil, around the plant to block off intruders.

As our work was coming to an end, we were greeted by a surprise. The head writer of the Cupertino Courier was there to take pictures, and a nice color photo was featured in the January 6<sup>th</sup> issue! This event was made possible by the funds raised through honey sales, and the help from Barbara Banfield and Cheryl Turner, subject matter experts at Mc Clellan Ranch and we wish to thank them. We are hoping to repeat this event and hope others will join us!

We hope to bump into many of our new friends at future rabbit shows. It was a wonderful day. The testing was nerve-wrecking because we had never been to the State Field Day before, but everyone, especially the hosts were amazingly helpful. We have to admit that we finished our tests last and a little into lunch, but we finished!

For the novice division, I won first place in showmanship and in the knowledge test, second place on judging and third place in the breed identification.
