A message from Vice President Allen-Diaz



Dear Friends,

Whether you retired 1 year ago or 20, those of us who have the privilege of working for ANR today stand on your shoulders. You sustained and strengthened a 100-year-old foundation that is essential to our ongoing service to the people of California.

Last year, ANR faced many challenging issues – issues such as finding solutions to nitrate pollution of groundwater through research, education, and partnerships and responding to the huanglongbing virus by utilizing more than 10 years of research and education on the ecology of the Asian citrus psyllid. There were many, many more. If you follow ANR Report and periodically review the ANR website, you will have learned of some of the other challenges and solutions.

It was a year of many accomplishments. We developed and introduced Informatics and Geographic Information Systems (IGIS), a statewide program that will enable academics and the public at large greater access to long-term data collected at our research and extension centers. And we benefitted from the work of hundreds of volunteers who devoted tens of thousands of hours to our Master Gardener and 4-H Youth Development programs. Enrollment in 4-H increased and our trained Master Gardeners are helping to minimize the use of pesticides and fertilizers in our local communities.

The passage of Proposition 30 stabilized our state budget for the time being. Nonetheless, we must continue to seek new revenue sources and ways of reducing costs as unfunded, mandated costs continue to rise.

To help us better understand critical issues facing communities in the coming years, we gathered at an ANR Statewide Conference earlier this month in Ontario, California. The conference began with a Global Food Systems Forum to address how to sustainably feed 8 billion people by 2025. We brought together farmers, researchers, economists, policymakers, geopolitical experts, and environmentalists to

engage in what was a provocative and stimulating discussion. A simultaneous webcast was viewed by 1,500 unique viewers from 34 counties. I invite you to view the Global Food Systems Forum video online at <http://food2025.ucanr.edu/webcast/>.

Additionally, the conference was an opportunity for ANR to examine our Strategic Vision, our initiative process, and new opportunities altogether. The challenges are tremendous; the commitment and dedication of our ANR colleagues is inspiring and powerful.

We are grateful to you for your part in strengthening and sustaining ANR and are very proud to continue this exceptional tradition of research and extension that improves the lives of all Californians.

2011-12 PRIVATE SUPPORT FOR ANR

Private gift revenue for Cooperative Extension in 2011-12 exceeded \$2.3 million. Gifts were received from more than 850 individual donors, 357 corporations, and 93 foundations, or not-for-profit entities. Additionally, the California 4-H Foundation received \$893,088 in private support for the benefit of 4-H youth development programs and activities throughout the state. Private gifts enhance our research, extension, and youth development programs in myriad ways.

In the past 9 months, new partnerships between the agricultural community and ANR have been forged. Three agricultural commodity groups have made multi-year pledges to support UC Cooperative Extension specialist and advisor positions. These donations recognize the importance of research and delivery of new information for the sustainability of California agriculture.

The privately funded positions are:

- Rice Research Board of California - \$1.272 million for a rice specialist
- California Table Grape Commission - \$840,000 for a viticulture advisor, specializing in table grapes
- California Pistachio Research Board - \$1.5 million for a nut and fruit pathology specialist

Other recent and notable gifts for ANR include:

- a bequest in the amount of \$160,000 from James and Eleanor Morris, for the benefit of Stanislaus County 4-H
- a screenhouse built and deeded by the Citrus Research Board to Lindcove Research and Extension Center
- a new packline grader from the Citrus Research Board for sorting and grading citrus at Lindcove Research and Extension Center

Personal messages from members of the ANR family



W. James Clawson writes: "We have now been in Dallas, Oregon for 15 years and enjoy the area and scenery around us. I have found myself involved with our Dallas Rotary Club, The Polk Soil and

Water Conservation District, Polk County Livestock Association and more recently with the Polk Extension Service District. I co-chaired a successful ballot initiative and election to form a county tax service district to provide the county funds for supporting Extension. Our county, along with others in the west, suffered from losing the timber (or Rural School Act) funds. This resulted in becoming Chair of the Polk Extension Citizen Advisory Network and a place on the statewide Extension Citizen Advisory Network. Oregon State University Extension also faces tough choices in the face of budget reductions, but it is a change to be involved with a smaller more approachable University and State Government structure. Mel George and I are working on capturing some of the history of the UC rangeland research and extension programs which we plan to publish somewhere when completed. We find it a chore to collect information with so many who could fill in gaps now gone. Last year I also lost a friend and fellow range specialist in Oregon, Tom Bedell, who spent his early Extension career in California, ending up in Modoc County. We manage to enjoy travel and visiting family as we find ourselves able to do less work taking care of our 8 acres."

Juan N. Guerrero writes: "In January 2012, Juan and wife Luz sold their home in El Centro and moved to Ayaviri, Puno, Perú. Juan and his wife are working as missionaries with the Catholic Church in the Andes of Perú. In El Centro it was hot and below sea level, now we are at 13,000 ft and in constant cold (quite a 180° turn). At this altitude trees no longer grow, rural folks burn dried cow dung for fuel in the kitchen. Juan works as the director of a diocesan ag extension service and his wife works at the local parish. The local population is about 95% indigenous quechua-speaking peoples. We plan on staying in Perú for at least one or two more years. We have no car here, so we walk a lot. Juan has lost more than 40 pounds."

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Sonya Hammond writes: “My husband and I are still enjoying Greenville, SC. I encourage people to Google the city – it is mentioned in many 'best places' lists. I have gotten involved with the OLLI (Osher Lifelong Learning Institute) program at Furman University. Besides taking classes, I am now in charge of the "Friday Cultural Bonus Events.” These are one-time classes that showcase some aspect of local culture or current events that interest OLLI members. Each quarter I design and organize 14-18 classes – anything from wine tasting to hikes to cancer survivorship. A recent class that toured the large performing arts center – the Peace Center – had a waiting list of 46 people.”



Joanne P. Ikeda writes: “I am definitely extending the land grant mission of UC. This year I am Vice-President of the Society for Nutrition Education and Behavior.

I am responsible for planning the program for the 2013 Annual Meeting that will be held in Portland, Oregon, from August 9th through August 12th. It's a great chance to see UC colleagues. I also continue to work as a consultant for the Cartoon Network helping them implement their nutrition criteria for the use of their licensed cartoon characters in food marketing.”
