## A MESSAGE FROM VICE PRESIDENT GOMES President Dynes continues his tour of California communities

By visiting communities throughout the state, President Dynes continues to learn about UC agricultural research and

UCCE, and the many stakeholder groups who depend upon ANR for new technologies, science-based research and practical information. These tours illustrate the difference ANR makes in the agricultural industry throughout the state.

In the past 12 months I have accompanied Dynes to the Imperial Valley, Los Angeles County, the Central Coast, Half Moon Bay, and Fresno. ANR advisors and researchers in these communities met with him to explain the issues of local concern and their work related to those issues. These visits featured a wide variety of topics, from an EFNEP nutrition lesson and 4-H after-school programs for elementary school children to coastal marine programs and organic produce production.

A few highlights of Dynes' tours include a visit to the Desert Research and Extension Center

where he was introduced to the center's Farm Smart and Winter Visitor programs, which teach both K-12 students and retirees about agriculture. In San Diego he learned about the work being done to prevent catastrophic fires and bring federal, state and local governmental agencies together to develop improved response plans and fire policies. In Los Angeles County, Dynes participated in an afterschool 4-H CSI class which is designed to stimulate interest in science

through hands-on activities. The Half Moon Bay trip allowed for a visit to the Nurserymen's Exchange where he learned about UCCE's work to develop biological control strategies for insects.

Most recently, Dynes attended the 87<sup>th</sup> annual meeting of the California Farm Bureau Federation in Monterey. In his keynote address, Dynes spoke, among other things, about the importance of research, development and delivery in public research universities.

He went on to express his optimism for the future of the ongoing work of Cooperative Extension in response to the needs of the agricultural community.

Growers, producers, and community leaders who met with Dynes communicated a clear message: there is a continuing need for UC research to help the agricultural industry prevent crop disease, improve quality and reduce the environmental impact.

Dynes believes that Cooperative Extension is a model for research development and delivery, and has said "The best example of technology transfer I have ever seen is here, Cooperative Extension." ### **UC/ANR response to Katrina**

ANR has contributed to the University's effort to provide

assistance to the victims of Hurricane Katrina. Efforts within the Division have varied. Spanish Broadcast and Media Services adapted public service announcements on flood recovery and disseminated them to Spanish-language media in the areas affected by Hurricane Katrina. The Western Institute for Food, Safety and Security has coordinated with the UC Davis Medical School to distribute information on waterborne, foodborne, and zoonotic diseases. The DANR Guide to Disaster Preparedness website, developed by the School of Veterinary Medicine, provides detailed information on disaster planning and response. Throughout California, 4-H clubs have filled backpacks with games and activity books for children of displaced families, found homes for homeless animals, raised funds, and made duffel bags for victims to hold their personal belongings.

UCCE advisors have been invited by the UC Davis College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences to seek unpaid appointments as CE associates in the Agricultural Experiment Station. ## ANR SCHOLARSHIPS

ANR administers three scholarships for students of agriculture, each of which was made possible by the philanthropic foresight and generosity of the friends and family of those they honor.

The Howard W. Clark Memorial Prize was established in 1941 by a gift from Prudence Clark, widow of Howard Clark, former curator at the California Academy of Sciences. This fund provides an annual award to the “senior student” in the College of Agriculture, whose high scholastic achievement, talent for independent research, and other characteristics, with particular reference to either plant breeding or soil building, seem to show the greatest promise. This scholarship is available to students at Berkeley, Davis and Riverside.

Friends and family honored the former UC Berkeley dean Knowles Ryerson by contributing to a scholarship fund in his name. The Knowles A. Ryerson Award recognizes a foreign student of agriculture, in any curriculum, preferably after completion of junior year. This award is made on the basis of high scholarship, outstanding character and promise of leadership. Winners are selected from the Berkeley and Davis campuses on an alternating basis.

On the occasion of former UCCE advisor Bill Fischer’s retirement, friends and family contributed to a scholarship fund in his name. The Bill and Jane Fischer Scholarship is awarded to students pursuing degrees in vegetation management or weed science at any accredited California university (preference given to graduate students).

Announcements of these awards are made in January of each year and nominations/applications are due in April. Recipients are selected by Vice President Gomes in May.
