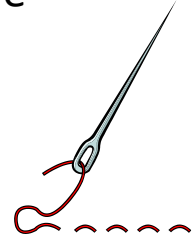

Senior (14 –19 years)

Category for Outfit:

Traditional - Outfit/garment created by participant (*Open to all members –Does not need to be enrolled in sewing project*)

Consumer Science Purchased - \$40 limit for everything showing **including** shoes, jewelry and accessories, but not sales tax. Receipts are **required**, with purchases made during the 2020-2021 4-H year. Receipts can be handwritten if from garage sales, thrift shops, etc. (*Open to all members –Does not need to be enrolled in sewing project*)

Box Challenge - Participants will sew one or more garments that contain 2 different fabrics. Also, choose from elements in the box. The box includes buttons, zipper, trim, contrast, or handmade accessory. (*Open to all members – Does not need to be enrolled in sewing project*) See the State Fashion Revue Website (http://4h.ucanr.edu/4-H_Events/SFD/SFR/) for more information on this challenge.

Vintage Challenge — Participants will create an outfit that is inspired by or looks like a design from 1900—2000 using new fabrics and notions. Must state the year or period of the design and include drawing photo or description of the classic design reproduced. (*Open to all members –Does not need to be enrolled in sewing project*) See the State Fashion Revue Website (http://4h.ucanr.edu/4-H_Events/SFD/SFR/) for more information on this challenge.

Cosplay Challenge- Participants will construct a cosplay costume. Start with a photo or drawing of the character that inspired the costume. Using any craft techniques and materials to make the costume. DisneyBounding is not considered Cosplay for this challenge. (*Open to all members –Does not need to be enrolled in sewing project*) See the State Fashion Revue Website (http://4h.ucanr.edu/4-H_Events/SFD/SFR/) for more information on this challenge.

2021 Contest Rules

1. The outfit must be produced and modeled by the individual member during judging and the fashion show (not created for someone else).
2. All outfits must meet the [4-H Dress Guidelines](#). For County (CFR) and State Fashion Revue (SFR), all shorts, skirts, dresses, etc. must be at least fingertip length due to the raised stage for the fashion show. County Fashion Revue coordinators will review all outfits based on these guidelines before SFR entry, with further review by the SFR Committee if needed.
3. All outfits entered in CFR and SFR must be suitable for comfortably walking, sitting, and going up and down stairs because of the schedule and location of SFR and the fashion show.
4. The 5 categories for 2021 CFR are Traditional, Consumer Science Purchased \$40 limit, and the 3 challenges: Box Challenge, Vintage Challenge, and Cosplay Challenge. Only these 5 categories are included for 2021 at the county and state events. All entries in the CFR must conform to the SFR category rules.
5. A member may only enter more than one item in the CFR. But, only one outfit in State Fashion Revue.
6. A garment worn in one entry may not also be worn in a different entry. For example, a top entered in a Challenge category may not also be entered in the Traditional category.
7. A county may qualify one member in each age division (Junior, Intermediate and Senior) and each of the five categories to advance to State Fashion Revue. This event will happen in May and will most likely be virtual. Participants should expect competition at SFR to be at a higher level than at the county events. 8. For all constructed categories, if you personalized a pattern for your style or fit, there is a section where you can explain this on your entry.
9. The information submitted at entry is printed for the evaluation panel. In addition, participants are encouraged to give a short oral presentation about their outfit. For juniors and intermediates, the time limit is 30 seconds. For seniors (changed

for 2020) the time limit is 1 minute. The evaluators will also ask questions and look at the outfits.

10. Participation in the afternoon CFR Fashion Show is a required element of the event.
11. Participants entering SFR may be dual-entered in State Presentation Day. It may not be possible to also enter Share the 4-H Fun skit due to scheduling conflicts. Talk to the SFR Registrar with questions before you sign up.
12. All SFR participants and family members are invited to attend the SFR Skillathon, workshops, and Silent Auction.
13. Additional rules may be added by the SFR committee as needed.
14. It is recommended that participants, families, and project leaders read the SFR Guide 2021 which will help you prepare for the event. Evaluators will be needed for the SFR. See the [Volunteer webpage](#).

2021 Fashion Revue CATEGORIES

Please note that any member can enter any category this year

Traditional

Participants in this category will construct garment(s), showcasing sewing skills and the ability to coordinate an outfit. The outfit must contain at least one constructed garment. Participants are encouraged to construct additional garments and/or accessories to complete the outfit. The garment(s) in this category must be sewn by the member as part of the Clothing & Textiles/Sewing Project.

There is no 4-H project requirement; *any 4-H member may enter this category.*

Consumer Science Purchased, \$40.00 Limit

Participants in this category will shop for an entire outfit with the total cost not to exceed \$40.00, including shoes but not sales tax. Receipts from the current 4-H year are required for any item that is visible. Gifts, prior purchases, and items without receipts are not eligible for this category. Receipts from yard sales, etc. may be hand-written. The participant should consider value vs. cost, versatility, the shopping experience, and coordination of the outfit within the cost limit.

There is no 4-H project requirement; *any 4-H member may enter this category.*

Box Challenge

For 2020: Use 2 different fabrics

Participants in this challenge will sew one or more garments that contain 2 different fabrics that are visible. They can be 2 different colors, 2 different textures, a print and a solid, or any other combination of 2 different fabrics. The fabric used for lining doesn't count. If one garment is sewn it has to contain the 2 different fabrics. If more than one garment is sewn, the sewn garments together must contain the 2 different fabrics. More than 2 fabrics may be used but that does not increase the scorecard points.

In addition, choose from the following elements that are in your box. Junior members must include at least two (2) in their sewn garment(s). Intermediate members must include at least three (3). Senior members must include at least four (4). The garment(s) must be sewn by the member as part of the Clothing & Textiles/Sewing project.

In the box:

- Zipper, functional
- Buttonholes, at least 2 that are functional
- Pockets, 2, any type
- Collar, waistband, or set-in sleeve
- Gathering or ruffle
- Darts or pleats, 2 or more
- Trim. Examples are, but not limited to: fringe, lace, bias binding, piping, etc.
- Hand-made accessory

There is no 4-H project requirement; *any 4-H member may enter this category.*

Vintage Challenge

The term "vintage" is used to describe clothing between 20 and 100 years old that is also clearly representative of the era in which it was produced. To be called vintage, the piece should strongly reflect styles and trends associated with that era. Participants in this challenge will create an outfit that is inspired by or looks like a design from 1900-2000, using new fabric and notions. The entry must state the year or period of the design and include a drawing, photo, or description of the classic design that is being reproduced or duplicated. Add accessories to complete the outfit that are reminiscent of that time period. The outfit must feature at least one handmade garment made by the member. Other pieces of the outfit must be representational and recognizable as belonging to the same era as the hand-made garment. The garment(s) in this challenge must be sewn by the member as part of the Clothing & Textiles/Sewing Project.

There is no 4-H project requirement; *any 4-H member may enter this category.*

Cosplay Challenge

Cosplay is the practice of dressing to resemble a fictional character from a movie, book, or video game. Cosplay can also depict an original character or a historical character.

Participants in this challenge will construct a cosplay costume. Start with a photo or drawing of the character that inspired the costume. Use any crafting techniques and any materials to make the costume. Pre-made, purchased costume kits, or parts of kits are not allowed. Accessories may be purchased. Do not include real or realistic weapons. The purchased garments may be used as a starting point for the costume (purchased jeans with sewn western shirt and vest; purchased blouse with a hand-made poodle skirt and scarf). The costume and its theme must be 4-H appropriate. For instance, you can modify the Wonder Woman outfit to wear pants, tights, or a longer skirt. The participant must be able to walk, sit, and use stairs while in the costume.

"DisneyBounding" is not considered Cosplay for this challenge. DisneyBounding is an outfit based on a Disney Character and is not considered a costume.

There is no 4-H project requirement; *any 4-H member may enter this category.*

2021 Service Projects

Face Masks and Port Pillows

Port Pillows are small and easy to sew out of soft fabric. They are used and much appreciated by patients undergoing chemotherapy infused through a port in their upper chest. The pillow attaches to the seat belt to cushion the port and reduce pain. Print the flyer and start sewing!

Face Masks If you have a sewing machine, cotton fabric and beginner skills, you can make face masks for your family, friends, and local medical facilities. These washable masks are in great need and will be much appreciated. In some facilities, they are worn by volunteers. In others, health care professionals are wearing them over their N95 masks.

Adding a piece of wire in the nose section helps the mask fit better. You can use the twisty ties from grocery store produce, thin wire, or pipe cleaners. These metal pieces are also available online.

Use elastic that is 1/4" or narrower. You might need to cut the elastic longer or shorter depending on the face width. You can also use 18" lengths of ribbon or make narrow bias tape.

Add 1 or 2 layers of a tightly woven fabric between the 2 outer fabric layers for better filtration. Suitable fabrics are flannel, sew-in interfacing, or plain cotton. Pre-shrink all fabric and elastic.

To make 12 masks with the JOANN's pattern you'll need:

- 1/2 yard each tightly woven 100% cotton fabric that can be washed & dried on hot. Use 2 different colors or prints, one color for each side of the mask
- 1/2 yard lightweight fusible interfacing
- 5 yards 1/4" or 1/8" flat elastic
