### UC inspires a love of nature to ensure future environmentalists

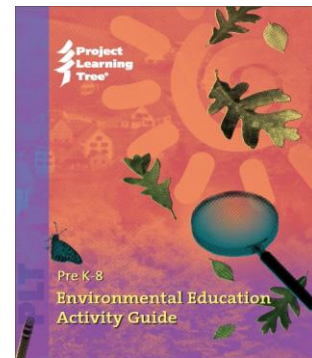

**AFT's soil health webinars. Learn how to determine economic and environmental impacts of healthy soils practices.**

### **Quantifying Economic and Environmental Impacts from Soil Health Practices**

AFT hosts webinars to train Agricultural Service Providers on how to help growers assess the economic and environmental impacts of soil health practices on their farms.

American Farmland Trust knows some growers need more quantitative evidence that soil health practices really do provide economic and environmental benefits before adopting

them. AFT has released two California case studies, which demonstrate how growing practices such as cover cropping, nutrient management, mulching, and compost applications can improve farm income, nutrient cycling, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions on farms.

Please join us for AFT's webinar series that shares **soil health case studies** of these two almond growers in California. Participants will learn how to use tools such as NRCS Level III T-Chart, USDA's Nutrient Tracking Tool, and USDA's COMET-Planner to help tree crop or wine grape growers assess the economic and environmental impacts of adopting these practices on their farms.

## Managing Weeds in Grasslands and Rangelands in the Context of Fire in California - Webinar

## UC Davis Wants Samples of Your Fermented Foods for Science

### Scientists Will Investigate Microbes in Fermented Fruits and Vegetables

It's not always easy to find silver linings during the COVID-19 pandemic, but here's one that food scientists at the University of California, Davis, have discovered: More people are exploring the ancient art of fermented foods. "My mom made her first batch of sauerkraut this summer," said Maria Marco, a microbiologist and food science professor with the UC Davis College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences. "With so many of us sheltering-in-place, fermented foods are more popular than ever."

Marco takes more than a culinary interest in America's latest food trend. Marco and Erin DiCaprio, a food safety expert and Cooperative Extension specialist at UC Davis, are investigating the microbial mysteries of fermented fruits and vegetables to better understand the role fermentation can play in healthy diets.

And you can help.

"We're calling on people from across the state to send us samples of their home ferments so we can characterize their microbial composition," Marco said. "Citizen scientists can help us expand the body of knowledge about the nutritional content and beneficial bacteria in fermented fruits and vegetables."

Marco, DiCaprio and their team of mostly undergraduate student scientists are looking for "fresh" ferments that are composed mainly of fruits and vegetables. By fresh, they mean samples taken right after fermentation, before refrigeration. They will be collecting samples for the next year. If you live in the Davis or Sacramento area, they can arrange to pick up your sample. If you live outside the area, or want to learn more, contact the team at [EAT LAC](#) (as in, lactic acid).

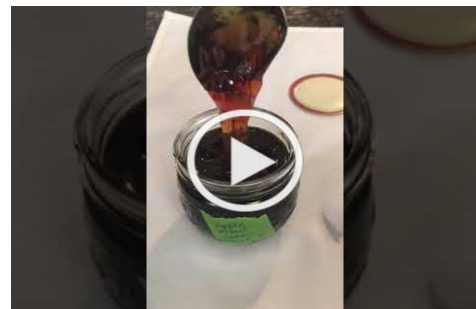
## Apple Fruit Honey

While making room in our chest freezer, I pulled out a couple of bags of frozen apple peels and cores saved from processing apples. My husband looked at them and said, "Why did you save garbage?"

Trust me, it's not garbage!

I save apple peels and use them to make a fruit honey. There's actually no honey in the final product; the only ingredients are apple juice and sugar, which I cook down with a boil until the liquid is thick with the consistency of



honey. A friend's son, Carlo, likes to add apple honey to milk and heat it. He says it tastes just like a Bit O Honey candy. I use it as a flavored sweetener in meals, desserts – and drinks.

It's easy to make, too, and you can start with any quantity of scraps. I've made strawberry fruit honey and it was delicious. Peach and pear honey are also treats. Enjoy!

#### Making Fruit Honey

*(So Easy to Preserve, University of Georgia)*

1. Place clean fruit peels and pieces in pot and cover with water. Put the lid on the pot and cook slowly until the peels are soft.
2. Strain through damp cheesecloth or a jelly bag; pressing to remove all of the juice.
3. Measure the amount of juice and the same amount of sugar.
4. Place the juice in a pot and heat to a boil.
5. When it boils vigorously, add the sugar.
6. Stirring frequently, boil the mixture until it has the consistency of honey.
7. Pour into hot, sterilized jars, leaving 1/4-inch headspace. *(To sterilize the jars while you're cooking the fruit honey, boil the jars for 10 minutes plus 1 additional minute for every 1,000' your location is above 1,000' feet elevation.)*
8. Clean the rims, apply the lids and rings, and process in either a boiling water or steam canner for 5 minutes at elevations of 0-1,000', 10 minutes above 1,000'.
9. After you remove the jars from the canner and place them on a towel or other protected surface, let them sit for 12-24 hours to ensure a strong seal. Remove the rings, clean and label the jars, then store in a cool, dry, dark location.

## Master Gardener Training in Tuolumne & Calaveras Counties

The University of California Cooperative Extension (UCCE) invites adults interested in helping others learn about gardening and to apply to train as a Master Gardener volunteer. UCCE Master Gardener volunteers learn University-based scientific information and then share that knowledge with the gardening community. Master Gardener volunteers are people of all ages and from all walks of life with a common desire to help others learn about gardening.



Master Gardener membership is open to anyone in Calaveras and Tuolumne counties. A background check including fingerprinting is required to become a Master Gardener.

This year due to COVID 19, the Master Gardener Training will be a hybrid model. The training will include recorded lectures, live Zoom meetings, and some in person workshops. The training classes for new volunteer candidates begin Thursday, January 21, 2021 and continue weekly through April 29th. These classes will include over 50 hours of intensive training by University of California personnel and horticulture specialists in various fields. Topics include water management, soils, composting, native plants, fruit production, plant diseases, entomology, Integrated Pest Management, understanding pesticides, and more.

A fee of \$195 will be charged to cover the cost of all class materials, which includes several reference texts. After successfully completing the training program, certified Master Gardener volunteers agree to fulfill annual volunteer service and continuing education requirements. If there is room, training will also be offered at the professional rate of \$350. At the professional rate, there are no volunteer requirements.

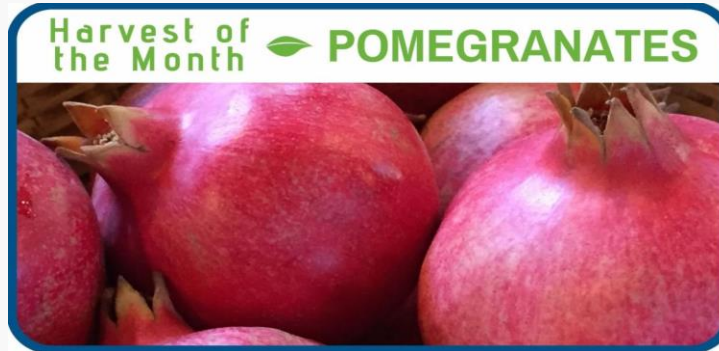

## Harvest of the Month



November is a prime month to enjoy pomegranates, which grow well in the Central Sierra and most of California. In fact, more than 90% of all the pomegranates grown for sale in the U.S. are produced here in California, where they enjoy sunny, dry summers. Pomegranates are at their peak during the Fall, and a ripe pomegranate should feel firm and heavy for its size, reflecting an interior that is well-filled with juicy seeds. The seeds inside are actually known as arils, small juice sacks with tiny seeds at their center. Pomegranates are related to berries and are known as being a “superfood” due to their high levels of antioxidants, which help protect our cells against damage when eaten regularly. Pomegranates are also excellent sources of Vitamin C, Vitamin K, and fiber, and good sources of potassium and folate.
