Participants will change into to garments once arrived at event. Judges will meet individually with each contestant to complete the judging process. There will be two rooms of judging occurring simultaneously. Downtime can be used to practice modeling on the stage – help will be available. The Fashion Revue starts at 3:30pm, at the Lassen View stage, in the cafeteria; friends and family encouraged to attend.

All entries in the Traditional Division are highly encouraged to enter their garment in the 4-H Still Exhibits Event. Still Exhibits event will be held at Lassen View School Gym on March 25th. Garments will be released prior to the 1pm check in. Primary members can enter any division.

EVENT GOALS:

- Build self-confidence and poise by developing self-concept and the ability to make the most of one's personal attributes.
- Develop judgment and creativity in planning an attractive ensemble that expresses their individual lifestyle.
- Gain consumer skills in making and purchasing clothing and accessories and in purchasing and using equipment related to clothing construction and care.
- Provide recognition to youth achieving these goals.

WHO CAN ENTER?

All 4-H members (5 – 19 years old)
Some divisions limited to Clothing & Textiles/Sewing project members only.

HOW DO I ENTER?

All participants must complete the survey available at <http://cetehama.ucanr.edu/4-H Program/> or the attached entry form. Entries are due to the UCCE 4-H Office at 1754 Walnut Street, Red Bluff or may be emailed to jmoylear@ucanr.edu no later than Thursday, March 9, 2023 at 5pm.

DIVISIONS

4-H members are limited to one entry per division.
No limit on number of divisions entered.

1. Traditional:

This division features garments the participant has constructed for him/herself, showcasing sewing skills and the ability to coordinate an outfit. The outfit must contain at least one constructed garment; participants are encouraged to construct additional garments to complete the outfit. The garment(s) in this category must be sewn by the member as part of the Clothing & Textiles/Sewing Project.

2. Consumer Science, Purchased:

Participants in this category will shop for an entire outfit with the total cost not to exceed \$50.00, including shoes and accessories, but not sales tax. Receipts from the current 4-H year are required for any item that is visible. Gifts, prior purchases, and items without receipts are not eligible for this category. Receipts from yard sales, etc. may be handwritten. The participant should consider value vs. cost, versatility, the shopping experience, and coordination of the outfit within the cost limit. Must submit copy of receipts at time of entry.

The following divisions are local divisions only, **not** offered at State Fashion Revue, no sewing project enrollment required:

3. Upcycled:

Take one or more existing garments and turn them into a new, different, and wearable garment. Additional fabrics, trim and supplies may be used during the construction process. Additional upcycled and/or sewn garments are encouraged to complete the outfit. A "before" photograph showing the original garment(s) is required. This is not an alteration - such as a large dress taken in to fit a smaller person that still retains the same lines. It is where the garment has been cut apart and remade into a new garment that looks different. The emphasis is on the transition of the garment. The outfit entered in the Upcycled category must include an accessory of your choice, handmade by the participant.

4. Team:

Teams may consist of two members of any ages. The team must be wearing coordinated outfits, sewn, bought, or from your closet, etc. Use your imagination.

5. Anything Goes:

Select your favorite garment to model. Buy something new or better yet check out your closet and find a special outfit you wore to a holiday party, a wedding, or your graduation!

State Fashion Revue Challenges – Offered locally and at State Fashion Revue:

These challenges change from year to year.

6. State Fashion Revue- Soffie Challenge:

What is a soffie? A stuffed animal, cloth doll, plush toy, soft sculpture, or fabric toy. In this challenge, the participant will sew, felt, knit, or crochet a soffie using a pattern or their own design. Any type of fabric and any embellishment techniques (trims, embroidery, yarn hair, re-moveable clothing) may be used. Participant must present the entry themselves at the Fashion Revue event.

This category has no 4-H project requirement and must be shown by the member at the Fashion Revue event. Will be displayed at Still Exhibits.

7. State Fashion Revue – Costume Challenge:

Participants in this category will create a costume for themselves or another person using any technique, materials, or pattern. It does not need to be sewn from fabric. The costume can be any theme and from any time, place, or country as long as it is 4-H appropriate. 70% of the costume must be handmade by the member; 30% can be handmade or purchased. The member must be able to move comfortably in the costume - sit, stand, walk, and go up and down stairs.

This category has no 4-H project requirement and must be modeled by the person it was sewn for at the Fashion Revue event. The member must be present and participate at the Fashion Revue event if it was sewn for another person. Will be displayed at Still Exhibits.

8. State Fashion Revue – Make It With Wool

Participants in this category will sew, knit, or crochet garment/s from 100% wool, wool blend (minimum of 60% wool) fabric or yarn or specialty wool fiber. Specialty fibers include alpaca, angora, camel, cashmere, llama, mohair, and vicuna. The entire garment body (front, back, and sleeves) must be wool or wool-blend fabric. Vests worn with a suit, sport coat, or blazer may have a back

of non-wool fabric. Vests worn as a top layer or with outerwear coat/jacket must have a wool back. Trims, facings, interfacings, linings, and/or under linings may be fabrics other than wool or wool blends. Hand-spun yarns and/or hand-woven fabrics may be used and must meet above criteria.

Garments created for the Make It With Wool competition that is supported by the American Sheep Industry meet the requirements for this category. (<https://makeitwithwool.com/welcome>) If you choose to enter the Make It With Wool competition, it is your responsibility to ensure that your entry meets the Make It With Wool requirements. <https://makeitwithwool.com/the-facts> The garment/s in this category must be sewn by the member as part of a 4-H Clothing & Textiles Project* and modeled by the member at the Fashion Revue event. Will be displayed at Still Exhibits.

9. State Fashion Revue- Leather Creations:

Participants in the Leather Creations category will create any leather accessory – purse, wallet, belt, saddlebag, key fob, etc. – in any style. Any leather techniques may be used (tooling, carving, dying, painting, shaping, stitching, etc.) Materials used may be any leather, suede, or faux leather products. This category has no 4-H project requirement and must be shown by the member at the Fashion Revue event. Will be displayed at Still Exhibits.

10. State Fashion Revue- Quilts:

Participants in this category will sew a quilt of any size and pattern. The quilt must have finished edges and may use any quilting method (machine, hand, hand-tie, etc.) The item/s in this category must be sewn by the member as part of a 4-H Clothing & Textiles Project* and shown by the member at the Fashion Revue event. Will be displayed at Still Exhibits.

Additional Notes:

For participants 9 and above:

A county winner for each age group will be selected from the Traditional, Consumer Science, and the three State Challenge divisions. All County Winners are eligible to participate in the State Fashion Revue. SFR is held at UC Davis each May.

Modesty Guidelines:

All outfits must meet State 4-H Fashion Revue modesty guidelines. Formal wear may be strapless or have spaghetti straps. Backless dresses, excessive visible cleavage, visible undergarments, lingerie or swim suits are not permitted. All shorts, skirts, dresses, etc. must be at least fingertip length. All outfits must be suitable for comfortably walking, sitting, and going up and down stairs.

The specific objectives of a commentary are:

- To introduce the member and his/her project.
- To focus on skills learned in the clothing and textile project.
- To express challenges, fashion trends, and cost savings.
- To interest the audience in 4-H activities.
- To display the garment attractively.



Things to consider:

1. Analyze the garment. What is special about it? Be sure to include color descriptions!
2. List major features you want to describe, along with a few comments that relate to the garment and how it will be worn. Create an appealing mental picture with descriptive words.
3. Study mail order fashion catalogs, magazines, the pattern envelope, and advertisements to see how they describe similar features. This is especially useful for beginning projects such as skirts that don't have a lot of details.
4. Describe the garment by starting with the obvious, and then call the audience's attention to details such as accessories that relate directly to the garment.
5. Write. Get down all you want to say. Don't worry about the length -- yet.
6. Use alliteration (words beginning with the same sound).
7. Use action words as much as possible. (A belt circles the waistline, a flaring hem swings, etc.)
8. Tell the biggest problem you encountered in sewing the outfit, what new sewing technique you learned. Saying you put in the sleeve six times can encourage some of your audience who are less skilled to keep on trying.
9. If there are two parts to your outfit, such as a coat and dress, mention the outer layer first.
10. Edit. Polish your narration, cut out repetitious phrases or ideas. Keep sentences short and avoid tongue twisters. Aim for clear, concise phrases that create audience interest. Make it as bright, crisp, and informative as possible. The audience is there to learn about new fashion as well as to be entertained.
11. Read your narration aloud to a friend. Does your friend know what you are talking about? Practice modeling with your narration. Do you think of other things that you might say? Re-edit and re-read. Be sure to write in the third person.
12. Read your narration aloud and time it. It should take 45 seconds to 1 minute to read.

Start with an Outline:

You can use this outline to help you write a short commentary of your own.

- Name
- Age
- 4-H Club
- Grade in school, name of school
- Garment description (reference pattern for key descriptors)
- Description of fabric (color, texture, fabric design)
- Where do you plan on wearing the garment?
- Include a few items of special interest about yourself (hobbies/activities)



Examples:

1. Gleaming in her sequined skirt, Kathleen Mitchell is modeling a stylish denim look. It is hard to believe, but this cloth was once a lonely remnant just waiting to be snatched up! This remnant now has a multi-purpose. For example, it will be this year's Easter outfit, and then be worn as a casual around-the-town skirt. It has a light and airy feeling, with its slit in the back. Her biggest challenge was matching the sequins as she cut out the fabric. This 11-year old homeschooler loves Irish Dancing and sketching her fashion ideas. Kathleen is in her second year of sewing with the Pleasantville 4-H Club. She is enjoying every minute of it!
2. Christina Williams will be warm and stylish in her new wool jacket and skirt. The black, 100% wool jacket is fully lined, with princess seams and a front, center zipper. She used a "New York Collection" Vogue pattern to sew her jacket and shortened it to fit her own personal style. The light blue, 100% Pendleton wool skirt is lined at the yoke and has an invisible zipper on the side. Christina designed the pleats herself, because she could not find a pattern that she liked. To put a finishing touch to the outfit, Christina designed and made her blue, Australian Crystal earrings. Christina has been in the Highland 4-H Club for 9 years and has been a Junior Leader for the sewing project for four years. Christina will enjoy wearing her new fashionable outfit.
