The Asilomar State Beach & Conference Grounds, in Pacific Grove, served as the venue for the 2012 Senior Leadership Conference. Nancy Franz, inspirational keynote speaker at the workshop, presented her views on raising public awareness on the impact of the 4-H program on broader communities. Franz is the Associate Dean for Extension and Outreach to Families and 4-H Youth Development in the College of Human Sciences at Iowa State University. She is also the Director of ISU Extension and Outreach to Families. Nancy gave thought provoking ideas as to how to properly release press statements. For instance, instead of saying "4-H Members Clean Up Neighborhood Park," she suggested maybe stating "4-H Community Clean-up Project Leads to Higher Property Values and Lower Crime Rates".

Linda Corrales, Program Representative for the County of San Diego 4-H, and who also attended the event, states, "We did not have enough hours in the day to attend all of the useful sessions being offered.

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Each workshop was full of committed 4-H staff and knowledgeable 4-H leaders, all of which traveled from all over the state. Mealtime was a great opportunity for meeting and greeting new and seasoned 4-H individuals. The silent auction and information board was both educational and entertaining. The evening games of friendly competition between sections were creative, raucously entertaining and...South Section came in second place! (By the way, South Section was the only group with a female representative! She was great!) There was also the recognition of volunteers by how long they served. Which was so very moving. There have been people onboard as 4-H volunteers for over 50 years; what better testimony to the worth and resiliency of such a valuable organization.... PRIMARY FUNCTION:

San Diego 4-H County Council is organized to assist the University of California Cooperative Extension (UCCE) in planning, promoting and carrying out 4-H youth development work. The San Diego County Council is chartered by the UCCE and operates in compliance with UC policies and the mission, core values, and framework of the 4-H Youth Development Program (YDP). Policy interpretations are made by 4-H YDP staff, the County Director and the Statewide 4-H YDP office, which are authorized under federal and state statutes to organize and administer the 4-H YDP in the State of California.

SPECIFIC DUTIES:

Help implement programs and projects based upon the educational framework of the 4-H YDP and the educational goals and standards as identified by the county and state 4-H YDP staff.

Help ensure that all county 4-H YDP programming is consistent with the 4-H YDP mission and direction, guiding principles, core values and 4-H program criteria checklist.

Build mechanisms to achieve affirmative action goals and develop a management body whose membership is representative of the diversity of the community.

Include involvement of members in County Council operations and decision-making.

Set limitations on term length and succession of adult volunteers to distribute more service opportunities.

Develop mechanisms to recommend solutions to problems and disputes within the county 4-H YDP.

Facilitate mechanisms for providing training and support of adult volunteers and youth.

Facilitate community involvement to contribute to program focus and direction.

Facilitate the expansion of programs into new communities.

2013 San Diego County Junior Leadership Camp

This camp is open to 4-H members and military youth grades 6, 7, and 8 only (for home schooled youth, age 11 by December 31st.) A member does not have to be a Junior Leader to attend. Chaperones must be a minimum age of 25 years old. The Conference is organized and conducted by the San Diego County Teen Council. Delegates will participate in sessions, workshops and activities that will help them develop leadership skills and increase their knowledge of 4-H.

WHEN: Friday- Sunday, January 25th- 27th.



CHECK IN: 5 P.M.- 7 P.M. Friday, January 25th. CHECK OUT: 12P.M- 1 P.M. (Must be picked up by 1 P.M.) Delegates will not be allowed to leave the conference for any reason once they have checked in. If you cannot stay, please do not register- NO EXCEPTIONS. No late checkin. WHERE: Camp Oliver, 8761 Riverside Drive, Descanso CA

COST: \$100 for everyone, including delegates, session leaders and chaperones. Includes Friday night SNACKS ONLY, NO DINNER; 3 meals on Saturday; Breakfast on Sunday

SESSION LEADERS: Members giving presentations must fill out a session application and a mandatory audition on December 10th. Session Leaders must be in high school and age 14 by December 31st 2012- no exceptions! Sessions should last 60 minutes and should not be repeats from the past two years.

All camp applications due to the county office by January 11th!

ACCOMODATIONS: Cabins with bunk beds; central showers; restrooms and dining hall. Bring a sleeping bag, pillow, warm blankets, towels, washcloths, etc. Girls and boys will be in separate cabins. Delegates are expected to attend all sessions- part of the learning process is meeting new people and sharing ideas and experiences!

DRESS: Warm camp clothes- Jeans, T-shirts, sweatshirts, jackets, comfortable shoes. Casual, but warm. The 4-H dress code will be strictly enforced. There will be a party and dance on Saturday evening, so bring nice clothes or a dress if you'd like. For non-dancers, there will be games and movies.

TRANSPORTATION: All participants provide their own transportation to and from camp. REQUIRED: Medical Release Health History Form, Junior Leadership Camp Application, Camp Fees, Code of Conduct Form

Clubs must turn in the delegate applications together as a group along with chaperone applications and club check. Individual checks will not be accepted. Conference limit is 100 delegates. Reserve your space now!! Please include a separate sheet of paper with your club name, number and a list of delegates being paid for. Your club will be required to send chaperones if you have 3 or more members attending the conference. We need adult chaperones (male and female) 1 per 8 members of the same gender. If this quota is not met, we will have to refuse the last delegates to register.
