### All Star Applications Available - REMINDER

An All Star is the highest rank that a 4-H member can achieve at the County level. The goal of the All Star program is to recognize the achievements of active 4-H members and to offer additional resources and opportunities for leadership, career and life planning.

To become a Calaveras County 4-H All Star you must meet criteria that includes: be in 9<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade: be eligible for or have earned your Gold Star; and have completed at least two years as a 4-H member by July 1<sup>st</sup> of the year you are selected. Are you, your 4-H project or community club finding ways to help victims of the Butte Fire? WaysToHelp.org invites teens in the United States to apply for grants to fund their community service ideas across any one of the 16 issue areas. You can apply for a grant by visiting <u>www.waystohelp.org</u> Select "See Ways To Help" followed by "Apply for a Grant". Applications are short - just 5,000 words or less - and should summarize: how the project will involve others, who it will help, what effect it's expected to have, when it will start and how the funds will be used. Grant requests are reviewed and responded to on a monthly basis.

#### **Butte Fire Recovery Event – Please Pass Along**

The Calaveras County Chamber of Commerce will be hosting a Butte Fire Business Recovery Event on Monday, January 11, 2016 from 4:00pm- 7:00pm at Ironstone Vineyards which is located at 1864 Six Mile Road in Murphys, CA. Refreshments and light appetizers will be provided.

This informative workshop will provide valuable resources to businesses who have suffered direct and indirect economic injury as a result of the Butte Fire disaster. Through collaboration with multiple which include the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Governor's Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) and the United States Economic Development Administration (EDA) this event will discuss programs designed to help you rebuild your businesses.

Speakers for the event will include Joe McClure from the Small Business Administration (SBA), Carol Pranka from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Keith Rogers from Valley Economic Development Center (VEDC), and Nate McBride from the Northeastern California Small Business Development Center, San Joaquin Delta College (SBDC). Introductions of the leaders from the various agencies will be made from 4:00pm - 4:30pm and business resource support and counseling will take place from 4:30pm - 7:00pm. This free "one on one" support and business counseling will be available to help businesses develop a long-term recovery plan.

#### Who Is Signing Your Club's Checkbook?

Please note that any time a check is written on your club's checks, the check must be signed by two <u>unrelated</u> individuals. In other words, the two signors cannot be related (husband and wife, or parent and child). This is 4-H State policy. Thank you!

#### **Raising Funds for Your 4-H Project or Community Club**



Because the 4-H program is a public institution supported by tax dollars, the raising of funds for use by 4-H projects or clubs using the 4-H name or emblem must be done in accordance with the guidelines established by the University of California Cooperative Extension.

Fundraising should be limited to the budgeted needs of the group. Each 4-H club should establish a budget during the early part of the 4-H year. This budget should reflect any and all fundraising efforts that 4-H project groups or 4-H clubs intent to hold.

Money making projects are valuable opportunities for members to learn-by-doing. 4-H members need to work together as a team to raise money and they need to learn to earn. They should be encouraged to raise funds that emphasize fair prices for needed services such as attending camps or conferences rather than asking parents or businesses for funds.

The club's treasurer should bank all funds in the club's name and there should be signatures of two unrelated people on each check. No checks are to be made out to cash. In the memo section of the check, write down the purpose of the check (ex.: Reimbursement for film). Any checks and cash collected are to be deposited within 7 days of receipt.

If a 4-H project wishes to raise funds for special events, it is required that they keep these funds in the 4-H club's account. The club treasurer separates accounts for each project so that each group uses only their money. Again, please remember that 4-H project fundraisers should be part of the club's annual budget **and voted on by the club membership**. A fundraising form should also be completed by the club officer, the 4-H leader and 4-H staff, and County Director. Please note! There is no requirement that a 4-H club must spend their entire club or project monies by the end of the 4-H year. It is acceptable for a club to carry money into the next 4-H year.
