1. What ownership/lease requirements and supervision requirements are there to show or exhibit a horse at an endorsed fair, exposition, sponsored show or sponsored event?

The 4-H Policy handbook requires that horses must be owned/leased and supervised for not less than 120 consecutive days prior to the endorsed fair, exposition, sponsored show or other sponsored event (Ch. 7,IV,E,6).

2. Do the CDFA State Rules for California Fairs outline additional requirements regarding leased horses?

Yes. According to the State Rules for California Fairs, "4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent exhibitors may show leased horses, provided the member has responsibility for the care and management of the horse during the period of the lease; and the signed lease between owner and member, with a clear picture of a side view of the horse or some permanent identification is filed at least 120 consecutive days prior to the fair or event/horse show if held separately from the fair, at the County 4-H, FFA, or Grange office, or with a person designated by those offices" (Ch 7,32,c).

3. I plan on showing my horse at my county fair which is a CDFA Division of Fairs and Expositions sponsored event; do I need to have a lease agreement on file with my County 4-H Office?

Yes, the State Rules for California Fairs require 4-H members to file a lease agreement with their County 4-H Office or with a designee of that office at least 120 consecutive days prior to the fair or event.

4. I do not plan on showing my horse at a CDFA fair or event; do I still need to have a lease agreement on file with my County 4-H Office?

No, 4-H members only need to have a lease agreement on file if they plan on exhibiting at a CDFA Division of Fairs and Expositions sponsored fair or event, or if the fair, exposition, or event that they are exhibiting at requires them to have a lease agreement on file with their County 4-H Office. 4-H members do not need to have a lease agreement on file with their County 4-H Office if they are showing at a 4-H Youth Development Program sponsored show, e.g., the State 4-H Horse Classic. However, 4-H members must still follow the horse ownership/lease requirements outlined in Chapter 7 of the 4-H Policy Manual.

5. Does the University of California Division of Agriculture and Natural Resources (UC ANR) 4-H Youth Development Program (4-H YDP) have an official equine lease agreement?

Yes. As of July 1, 2016 all counties are to use the <u>4-H Equine Lease Agreement</u>. This agreement contains the necessary fields to satisfy the lease agreement requirements outlined in the CDFA State Rules for California Fairs. This will ensure continuity and consistency statewide.

6. Can I continue using the horse lease agreement that my County 4-H Office created?

No. Going forward, all counties are to use the <u>4-H Equine Lease Agreement</u>. However, if your local fair, exposition or event requires youth to file an alternative lease agreement with their County 4-H Office, counties may use the agreement required by their local fair, exposition, or event.

7. What is the duration in which Equine Lease Agreements must be retained by the County 4-H Office?

Equine Lease Agreements should be retained for one year from the date in which the lease expires.
