

WHO CAN ENTER SFR?

If you are a 4-H Fashion Revue County winner in the following categories and age groups, then you qualify for SFR. 2020 categories are:

- ❖ Traditional
- ❖ Consumer Science Purchased \$40 limit
- ❖ Box Challenge
- ❖ Vintage Challenge
- ❖ Cosplay challenge

Age divisions for SFR as of 12/31/2019

- ❖ Junior, Age 9-10
- ❖ Intermediate, Age 11-13
- ❖ Senior, Age 14-18

One delegate per county in each category and age group may enter SFR. Registration is online only. The entry deadline is 5 PM on May 13, 2020.

Counties may offer additional categories and age groups but these entries do not advance to State Fashion Revue.

OTHER SFR ACTIVITIES

At SFR, the morning begins with check-in from 7-8:30 am, orientation at 8:30, followed by evaluation and other activities until approximately 11:45. Participants and family members are invited to attend Workshops, Make it - Take it sessions, the Photo booth, the Skillathon, and service activities. Visit the Silent Auction room where donations and purchases help the SFR committee with event expenses. Participation in the SFR fashion show in the afternoon is a required element of the event. SFR 2020 ~ Categories & Service Projects

Traditional

This category features garments the participant has constructed, showcasing sewing skills and the ability to coordinate an outfit. The entry must be sewn as part of the 4-H Clothing and Textiles project, and worn by the member, not constructed for someone else. The outfit must contain at least one constructed garment; participants are encouraged to sew additional garments to complete the outfit.

Consumer Science Purchased \$40 limit

The \$40.00 limit is for the entire outfit, including shoes but not sales tax. Receipts from the current 4-H year are required for any item that is visible. Gifts, prior purchases, and items without receipts are not eligible. Receipts from yard sales, etc. may be hand written. There is no 4-H project requirement, which means any 4-H member may enter this category.

For all Entries

All outfits must meet the 4-H Dress Guidelines, <http://4h.ucanr.edu/files/210170.pdf> For State Fashion Revue, all shorts, skirts, dresses, etc. must be at least fingertip length due to the fashion show raised stage. All outfits entered in SFR must be suitable for comfortably walking, sitting, and going up and down stairs because of the SFR schedule and location. County Fashion Revue coordinators will review all outfits based on these guidelines before SFR entry, with further review by the SFR Committee if needed.

Box Challenge

For 2020, sew a garment or outfit from 2 different fabrics. Use the required number of items from the Box. Juniors use at least 2, Intermediates at least 3, and Seniors at least 4. Items in the Box are: zipper, buttonholes, pockets, collar/waistband/set-in sleeve, gathering or ruffle, darts/pleats, trim, hand made accessory. The garment must be sewn by the member as part of the 4-H Clothing & Textiles project.

SFR Service Projects

SFR is coordinating two service projects for 2020.

Adult Bibs are for care home residents and can be sewn quickly from cotton fabric, with hook & loop closures. One yard makes one bib, front and back.

Personal Care Kits are sewn from small towels and filled with small containers of shampoo, toothpaste, toothbrush, etc. They are designed for homeless shelters and displaced persons.

All 4-H'ers are encouraged to make the service project items, then collect and deliver them in their home counties. They can both be sewn at home, at project meetings and at county events. See the flyers on the SFR website for patterns, directions, how to donate, and who to contact with questions. Please let the SFR committee know how many were made and donated. Your thoughtful donations will touch the lives of many!

Vintage Challenge

Participants in this challenge will create an outfit that is inspired by or looks like a design from 1900-2000, using new fabric and notions. The entry must state the year or period of the design and include a drawing, photo, or description of the classic design that is being reproduced or duplicated. Add accessories to complete the outfit that are reminiscent of that time period. The outfit must feature at least one handmade garment made by the member. Other pieces of the outfit must be representational and recognizable as belonging to the same era as the hand made garment. The garment(s) in this challenge must be sewn by the member as part of the Clothing & Textiles/Sewing Project.

Cosplay Challenge

Cosplay is the practice of dressing to resemble a fictional character from a movie, book, or video game. Cosplay can also depict an original or historical character. Participants in this challenge will construct a cosplay costume. Start with a photo or drawing of the character that inspired the costume. Use any crafting techniques and any materials to make the costume. Sewing is not required. Pre-made, purchased costume kits, or parts of kits are not allowed. Accessories may be purchased. Do not include real or realistic weapons. The purchased garments may be used as a starting point for the costume. The costume and its theme must be 4-H appropriate. "DisneyBounding" is not considered Cosplay for this challenge. There is no 4-H project requirement; any 4-H member may enter this category.
