

### **County Council Meeting**

The next County Council meeting will be Saturday, Jan. 15, 2005 at the LA County Office, 10AM followed by Judging Day Training from 12:00-2pm.

### Hi 4-H

Each district can have a Hi 4-H program. 4-H members who will be at least 14 years old by January 1, 2005 or who will be in 9th grade or above are eligible for Hi 4-H activities (ROPES, Snow Camp, T.I.C. conference, state leadership conference, etc.). You don't have to attend Hi 4-H meetings to attend the special Hi 4-H events. This year 13 year olds are again invited to attend Hi 4-H activities as guests.

The sectional level Hi 4-H is called the sectional Teen Council. It meets before sectional 4-H Leaders' Council meetings at Mt. SAC. The Teen Council plans social and educational events, plus runs the T.I.C. conference in January and a food booth at sectional field day in May. Our senior members can be part of the Teen Council. Our senior members can attend their events. Consider being more active on the sectional level. The county level Hi 4-H program will only exist if there is sufficient interest this year. Contact the county 4-H leaders' council if you are interested in participating in a county level Hi 4-H program.

### Junior/Teen Leader

Junior Leaders are 4-H members in the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade who help lead a 4-H project. Teen Leaders 4-H members are in 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup> and above grades who lead a 4-H project. To be a Junior/Teen Leader, the member needs to be enrolled in their club's Leadership Project. They fill out the goals and plans of the first two sections of the Leadership Plan and Report Form, and have the form signed by their Leadership Project Leader and the leader of the project for which they will be a youth leader. While they are a Junior or Teen Leader, they can wear the Junior or Teen Leader patch on their 4-H hat. At the end of the year, they will need to complete the Leadership Plan and Report and have it signed by their Leadership Project Leader and their project leader. They should also complete an Annual Project Report for the Leadership Project.

### **Emerald Star Project**

If a member has earned Gold Star Rank or will be 16 years old by January 1, 2005, they can consider doing an advanced leadership project and earn an Emerald Star for their hat. An Emerald Star Project can be started at any time during the year. Do you have an idea for an activity you could plan and run to benefit the county 4-H program or your community?

Call the 4-H office for a packet of information on the Emerald Star Program. Each 4-H district has an Emerald Star advisor. You can work with the Advisor from any of the districts.

### **Leadership development scholarships**

Leaders and members need to be reminded that there are budgeted funds in the LA 4-H Leaders' Council budget for leadership development for youth members and adult leaders. We encourage attending leadership development opportunities. If you decide to apply for these funds, be prepared to share what you learn with others in the county in some way.

### Don't sit back - STEP UP!!

4-H has so much to offer youth. There are great sources of information, chances for career exploration, opportunities to work with the latest technology, chances to learn and practice leadership, opportunities to help others and make a difference. All this will not happen if you just sit back and do not become really involved. You have to take ACTION. You have to STEP UP and DO IT! If something is not happening as you had hoped for, perhaps someone needs your help to make it happen or you are not doing your part. With everyone working together, 4-H can really be GREAT! Remember TO MAKE THE BEST BETTER!

### **2005 State Project Competition**

Senior 4-H members are eligible to pursue formal recognition beyond the county level for their accomplishments within the California 4-H Youth Development Program. It is a competitive process that is based on this application.

Whether senior 4-H members seek to measure achievements against established performance standards, the performance of their peers, or pursue their own self-set goals, this competition is intended to energize member's efforts to achieve those ends. The amount of time involved in 4-H is not in itself a deciding factor; it is what is done with that time.

The challenge to the senior 4-H member filling out this application is to present him/herself as positively as they can and still be accurate and honest. Being clear about goals and purposes is important. Thoroughly search records and memory for facts that can support those objectives. This application should be a true representation of the member's own words, experiences, ideas and feelings. Whether they place or not, members can feel proud of this effort that they gave it their best and it is an accurate reflection of them at this moment, both in its form and content.

It is important to show growth in the main project, in 4-H generally, and in your other pursuits. Emphasize recent achievements, and if there has been a tapering off in level of 4-H activity in the categories being considered, make it clear to where energies have been shifted.

### **Eligibility**

Applicants must have reached the age of 14 prior to January 1st and be no older than 19 years old by December 31st of the current 4-H year to be eligible to apply. Applicant must be currently enrolled in the project/activity in which they are applying. Previous state winners in a project/activity are not eligible to apply in the same project/activity, but may apply in another. Reserve state winners may apply in the same category, but are limited to a maximum lifetime total cash award of \$500 in any one category.

The Deadline for this application is August 20, 2005. Books due from Sectional to State by August 1, 2005.

### 2005 4-H Essay Contest Announcement and Rules

Sponsored by The Foundation for the Preservation of Honey Bees, Inc. Affiliated with the **American Beekeeping Federation, Inc**.

AWARDS: Cash Prizes to three top winners

1<sup>st</sup> Place ...... \$ 250.00

2<sup>nd</sup> Place ...... \$ 100.00

3<sup>rd</sup> Place ..... \$ 50.00

Each State Winner, including national winners, receives an appropriate book about honeybees, beekeeping, or honey.

### TOPIC: "Use of Honey Bees and Honey in Symbolism"

Honeybees and honey have been used symbolically throughout recorded history. Utah is the Beehive State; its motto is "Industry." Napoleon had bees on his throne and robes to symbolize that the emperor was working hard. "As busy as a bee" is part of our language, as is "honey of a job" and "Honey, I'm home." The U.S. Navy Construction Battalion was tagged "The Sea Bees." They became known for their ability to work under adverse conditions with few resources and used machine gun-toting bees in their emblem. Bees are inscribed in ancient Egyptian tombs – and so on. See how many symbols you can list and determine why bees and honey are so used.

**SOURCES:** Good leads for your research include your school and public libraries, your CE Farm Advisors, your local or state beekeepers' associations, or the beekeeping professor or extension specialist at your state's agricultural college. The Internet has an endless wealth of information; you just have to guess the right browser words to make your desired content pop up first. The ABF website <www.ABFnet.org> has links to other beekeeping sites.

The scope of the research is an essential judging criterion, accounting for 40% of your score. The number of sources consulted, the authority of the sources, and the variety of the sources all are evaluated.

Personal interviews with beekeepers and others familiar with bees and beekeeping activities are valued sources of information and should be documented. Sources, which are not cited in the endnotes, should be listed in a "Resources" or "Bibliography" list.

Note that "honey bee" is properly spelled as two words, even though many otherwise authoritative references and "Spell Checkers" spell it as one word.

### **RULES:**

1. Contest is open to <u>active</u> (dues paid) 4-H Club members, only. 4-H'ers who have previously placed first, second, or third <u>at the national level</u> are not eligible; other state winners are eligible to re-enter.

- 2. Requirements (failure to meet any one will result in disqualification):
  - a. Essay will be typewritten or computer generated, double spaced, 12 point, Times or similar type font, on one side of white paper following standard manuscript format.
  - b. Write on designated subject, only.
- c. The essay, proper, must contain 750 to 1,000 words. The word count does not include the endnotes, bibliography or references, or the biographical sketch.
  - d. A brief biographical sketch of the essayist, including date of birth, gender, complete mailing address, and telephone number, must accompany the essay.
- 3. Essays will be judged on (a) scope of research 40%; (b) accuracy 30%; (c) creativity 10%; (d) conciseness 10%; and (e) logical development of the topic 10%.
- 4. California essays should be submitted in time to reach the office of Dr. Eric C. Mussen, Department of Entomology, University of California, Davis, CA 95616 on or before by Friday, February 11<sup>th</sup>, 2005.
- 5. Final judging of the winning state entries will be conducted by the Foundation's Essay Committee and the National Winner will be announced by May 1, 2005.

### 2005 CALIFORNIA 4-H STATEWIDE SCHOLARSHIPS

The California 4-H Youth Development Program is committed to promoting higher education for 4-H members. The Statewide Scholarships are designed for graduating high school and collegiate-age 4-Hers to help fund educational expenses.

### General 4-H Scholarship, in memory of Mabel W. Jacks

**Award:** \$700 scholarship (up to five)

### **Eligibility:**

- Applicants must be high school seniors or high school graduates, between the ages of 16 to 25, residing in California or Nevada, who at the time of their graduation were members of 4-H.
- ➤ If already in college, applicants must be full-time students.
- Consideration will be given first to those students worthy of higher education, who in the absence of a scholarship might otherwise be unable to attend a college or university. Other students, regardless of their financial ability to attain higher education that have, through their devotion and attention to the principles and objectives of the 4-H program, shown themselves to be worthy of merit, may also be considered.

Awards shall be given to students pursuing any field of scholastic endeavor they may choose at accredited colleges or universities in the United States.

<u>Criteria</u>: Point values are given based on the information from the application:

- 1. Experiences in Leadership in 4-H YD and other groups
- 2. Experiences in Citizenship in 4-H YD and other groups
- 3. Future Goals
- 4. Financial Need

### Vocational Education 4-H Scholarship, sponsored by the Samarin Family

Award: \$1,000 scholarship

### **Eligibility:**

- Applicants must be high school seniors or high school graduates between the ages of 16 and 25, who were in the California 4-H Youth Development Program at the time of their high school graduation.
- Applicants must be enrolled in, or intending to enroll in (upon high school graduation), a vocational/trade school or Junior College vocational training program. Vocational Education "Organized educational programs which are directly related to the preparation of individuals for paid or unpaid employment, or for additional preparation for a career requiring other than a baccalaureate or advanced degree."
- Consideration will be given first to those students, who in the absence of a scholarship, might otherwise be unable to attend a vocational/trade school or Junior College vocational training program. Other students, regardless of their financial ability, in need of encouragement and support if they are to be trained in a vocational trade, may also be considered.

**<u>Criteria</u>**: Point values are given based on the information from the application:

- 1. How 4-H has influenced life and career goals
- 2. Plans to receive hands-on vocational education
- 3. How scholarship will help reach training goals
- 4. Financial need

### **Application Process:**

Applications must be postmarked by April 30, 2005 and sent to the California 4-H Youth Development Office. All required information must be included to be considered. The California 4-H Youth Development Office will notify recipients by June 1, 2005.

Applications must contain the following:

- Application Cover Page
- Essay Questions (not exceeding two pages)
- □ Letter of recommendation from a 4-H YDP Staff or 4-H Volunteer.
- □ Letter of recommendation from a 4-H Member or Alumni (not older than 21 years of age)
- "Proof of enrollment" (enrollment verification) from the applicant's high school (if high school senior) or vocational school or college (if high school graduate).

Any candidate with a disability preventing him or her from completing the application in the usual method should contact the California 4-H Youth Development Office for assistance.

### Japanese Exchange

Ariel Smoke was selected this year to serve as a Labo Intern in Japan. She will depart for Tokyo in September and live in Japan for one year, working for the Labo organization. Her duties will include:

- visiting and participating in Labo Parties (club meetings are called "parties" in Japan)
- staffing Labo winter and summer camps
- providing organizational support in the Labo office
- taking Japanese language instruction
- choosing and pursuing an independent study project.

Labo Interns spend one day a week working on their independent study with assistance from the Labo organization. Labo will provide Ariel with board and room and give her a monthly stipend. She is expected to work 40 hours a week and is given a two-week vacation and time off on traditional Japanese holidays.

Ariel is a 20-year-old 4-H leader from Fresno County. She attends Occidental College in Los Angeles and majors in Biology and Diplomacy &World Affairs with a minor in Japanese. At Occidental, she is involved in the Catholic community and Intervarsity Christian Fellowship. Her personal interests include: singing, reading, sketching, cooking, sewing, and hiking.

As a member of 4-H for six years, Ariel was a 4-H State Ambassador and active in planning the Youth Leadership Summit on two different occasions. She hosted teens in the Japanese Exchange Program in 1999 and 2001, and traveled to Japan on the seven-week summer program in 2000. She has presented at several statewide Japanese Exchange events and worked as a 2003 Travel Guide with the visiting Japanese teen delegation.

Ariel's desire to be an Intern is deep-seeded, "I've been in love with Japan as far back as I can remember. My family hosted half a dozen Japanese summer exchange students before I even entered elementary school. They were a part of my early childhood, their visits were the backbone of my summers, and their letters and gifts colored my life during the rest of the year. When I was growing up, if anyone asked me which country I would travel to if given only one choice, the answer was invariable Japan.
