A growing interest in getting back-to-basics, agriculture and community gardens, science, engineering and technology, and giving back to the community is in vogue once more. 4-H programs are experiencing a resurgence that we are very excited about, and hope to build our wonderful program into an example for other counties on what 4-H can really be.

The month of April has been a successful month for making new connections, and reaching out to various schools and youth in Los Angeles County. Outreach efforts are being targeted each month, and this month we focused on schools and youth in Whittier, Duarte and East Los Angeles. With the successful launch of the Harbor Lights 4-H Club in San Pedro led by Kim Espinosa, we are excited and encouraged to launch new clubs in Encino and Glendale.

Please help us by putting out the word with friends, family and community partners who may be interested in having youth join an existing club, volunteering to assist in a project, or even starting a new club. - **Check that all 4-H forms are completed correctly** - As we approach the end of this 4-H year, we again want to remind leaders and members that it is important that 4-H forms are completed correctly. Don't wait until the end of the year when everything is in a rush. Remember to have the records reviewed and signed by the appropriate leaders on time. Observe the deadlines when records must be turned in for evaluation and competition. It is not the responsibility of leaders to turn in member records, but as a courtesy to their members, some leaders do turn their members' records in for the competition.
- **County Record Book Judging** - All LA County 4-H Junior, Intermediate and Senior members are invited to enter their 4-H records (on the state forms) in the county competition. Record Books due to LA and AV offices by 4pm July 14, 2009 Record Books due to I&R committee members by 10pm on July 15, 2009. Record Book judging will be July 17, 18, 2009 with winners announced at County Awards Day July 26, 2009. Remember to enter your 4-H activity information on the “new” state record forms.
- **Forms for Recordkeeping - Making the Best Better** - The State 4-H asked members to make suggestions for improvements to the new recordkeeping forms that were used last year. A few modifications have been made to the forms so be sure to use the newest version when you do your records. The 4-H Record Book Manual, dated February 2008, is the most current. Look for the phrase "California 4-H Record Book Manual 2008" on the most current forms. A summary of the modifications to the forms can be found at: <http://celosangeles.ucdavis.edu/files/65994.pdf>
- **2008-2009 Officer Book competition** - Officer Books for the 2008-2009 competition will be due to the 4-H Office (LA or AV) by 4pm on September 15, 2009. The book must be submitted with a completed ID form. The 2009 ID form and guidelines are available online at: http://celosangeles.ucdavis.edu/4H_Youth_Development_Programs/Applications.htm. Start planning to enter an officer book now. Earn a medal for your officer book. Medals are given for Best in District and Best in County in each of the seven categories of the competition: President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, Reporter, Historian, and Other Officers.

The books will be judged after the LA County 4-H Leaders' Council meeting on September 19, 2009. Experienced leaders are requested to volunteer as judges. Contact Noel Keller (909-621-2373) to volunteer to judge. The results will be announced in the district Achievement programs, usually in October.

- **Emerald Star Project** - The Emerald Star program is an expanded Leadership opportunity. If a member has earned a Gold Star Rank or will be 16 by January 1, 2009, they can consider doing an advanced leadership project and earn an Emerald Star for their hat. What activity could they plan and run to benefit the county 4-H program or their community? **An Emerald Star Project can be started at any time during the year.** Call

the 4-H office for a packet of information on the Emerald Star Program. Each 4-H district has an Emerald Star Advisor. You can work with the Advisor from any of the districts.

This is a great opportunity to do some service for the 4-H program or your community. Examples of successful Emerald Star projects include 4-H being in an entry for the Rose Parade, organizing a community effort to “fix up” a women’s shelter, setting up the Entry by Video option for county field day. Can you think of something that you would like added to the LA County 4-H program? Consider working on setting up these types of activities as an Emerald Star Project.
