Letter from the ADSA® President

Robert F. Roberts



I want to thank you again for the opportunity to serve you as president of ADSA. It has been both an honor and a tremendous learning experience. As is our custom each spring, included below are a few highlights of our activities in 2011.

Journal of Dairy Science® (JDS)

By impact factor, JDS was ranked second out of 55 journals in the Agriculture, Dairy, and Animal Science category for 2011 by Thomson Reuters. However, when looking at the 5-year rolling average, JDS continues to be ranked number 1. It is also noteworthy that JDS was ranked number 1 by Eigenfactor (which removes self-citations) in the Agriculture, Dairy, and Animal Science category. The Dairy Foods component of JDS also fared well, ranking 18 of 125 for 2010, and 16 of 125 using the 5-year average in the Food Science and Technology category. The size

of JDS increased from 634 articles and 6,022 (science) pages in 2010 to a total of 640 articles and 6,258 (science) pages in 2011. This is a testament to the quality of our science, the tireless work of the editorial board and editor-in-chief Roger Shanks, as well as the staff at FASS who manage the editorial and production process and serve as highly valued consultants to ADSA.

Joint Annual Meeting (JAM)

By any measure, JAM 2011 in New Orleans was a very successful meeting, setting records for attendance at a two-society meeting, as well as the number of abstracts submitted and accepted. I am proud to note that ADSA members were responsible for 50% of the attendees at the 2011 JAM. In addition to the excellent science, the JAM continues to provide excellent networking opportunities. An important highlight of JAM 2011 was a visit by USDA Chief Scientist and Undersecretary for Research, Education, and Economics Catherine Woteki. Dr. Woteki spent a full day with us in New Orleans, listening to our concerns and providing insight into Washington science. JAM 2011 remained in a strong financial position. Finally, I want to extend a hearty thank you to the members of the various committees for the time and effort put into organizing and planning the meeting and offer special thanks to David Casper, the 2011 overall program chair, for his tireless and outstanding work. Abstracts and symposia for JAM 2012 have been received and evaluated, and are now being organized into what is shaping up to be another tremendous meeting. We look forward to your participation in a successful JAM in Phoenix this July.

ADSA Graduate Student Division

The ADSA Graduate Student Division (GSD) was successfully launched during the 2011 JAM under the direction of inaugural President Katy Proudfoot and her team of officers (Vice President Rachel Campbell, Secretary Fabio Lima, Treasurer Emily Hurt, Dairy Production Director Elizabeth French, and Dairy Foods Director Prafulle Salunke). This group has shown tremendous initiative and energy. As a result of a request from the student leadership of the GSD, the Board of Directors approved offering a transitional membership to students as they graduate and move into their first professional position. We are looking forward to watching this group grow and mature over the next few years. Our thanks to Janet Brown for providing excellent support to GSD.

Membership

Individual memberships increased by 10.9% in 2011, due in large part to very strong growth in graduate student membership. Professional membership stabilized, increasing by a modest 1.8%. The new limited membership category—e-membership (an option available to members outside of North America)—is gaining traction (35 as of 12/31/11), and we think this will serve as a way to reach an even broader international market.

S-PAC®

S-PAC continues to grow, with ever more contributing conferences (43) and proceedings (407). Ten academic libraries now subscribe to S-PAC via an IP address range subscription type, which the libraries requested. Some university faculty have reported they are using S-PAC in their course work, and we are looking into that model to see if it can be offered to others. Since its inception, S-PAC has more than recovered all the costs of developing and maintaining the system and operated solidly in the black for 2011. Any income from S-PAC contributes to the growth of the ADSA Foundation's net assets. The time and continuing effort to develop, improve, and market S-PAC are beginning to pay off. Special thanks go to Al Kertz for his tireless championing of the S-PAC project, and to Ken Olson for recruiting conferences and promoting S-PAC.

Discover Conferences

Discover conferences continue to be highly regarded and fully subscribed. The 2011 offerings, Discover 21, "Improving Reproductive Efficiency of Lactating Dairy Cattle," and Discover 22, "Milk Components: Opportunities for Maximizing Farm Gate Returns and Meeting Manufacturing Needs," received excellent evaluations from a global set of participants. Two Discover Conferences will be offered in 2012, the first on bovine immunity (May 29 to June 1; Itasca, IL) and the second on rumen biology (September 10 to 13; Naperville, IL). Credit for the success of these activities goes to the organizing committees for each of the conferences, as well as to Larry Miller for excellent leadership and highly effective program and business management, and to Molly Kelley for her excellent meeting planning and general support.

Member Satisfaction Survey

In an effort to develop an understanding of member needs and satisfaction, ADSA commissioned and conducted a survey of the professional membership in 2011. The vast majority of members responding (90.5%) indicated they were extremely satisfied (51.9%) or somewhat satisfied (38.6%) on a 5-point scale. In addition to ranking ADSA, an opportunity was provided for written responses to indicate what new services members would be interested in seeing initiated at ADSA. The responses to these open-ended questions will be used to inform our strategic planning process in July immediately prior to JAM. With the caveat that we can always do better, I think this is a good report card from a key segment of the membership. Read more about the membership survey on page 21 of this newsletter.

The Numbers

ADSA is in a strong financial position. Without increasing dues or JAM registration fees, association total revenues exceeded budget projections by 14% and expenses came in as budgeted (1% over budget). Although we, like everyone, took a paper loss in our investment accounts, much of this has already been recovered. ADSA, including the Foundation, had net assets of \$5.4 million as of 12/31/11. The JDS Superfund, designed to protect JDS and ADSA, stood at \$3.6 million, or 66% of total net assets.

Financial performance for the Foundation was very good. Foundation net assets increased by \$16,073 in 2011. This puts Foundation total assets at an all-time high of \$601,107 as of December 31, 2011.

So, I would like to take a moment to thank everyone who has worked and continues to work for the success of ADSA. The success of our society is due to your dedication and effort.

ADSA remains strong and active with the support of our members, our volunteer leaders, and our professional staff. At this time, it's my pleasure to report that the state of ADSA is excellent as we move into spring of 2012.

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Report from the JDS Editor-in-Chief

Please read my 2011 Editorial report in the April issue of the *Journal of Dairy Science*® (Shanks, 2012, J. Dairy Sci. 95:1587–1589). Highlights include a report of increased submissions of 97 per month and a relatively constant 57% acceptance rate. Over 65% of submissions are from countries other than the United States and Canada. Authors, editors, and staff who work on JDS have had a productive year as JDS continues to



grow. The FASS staff members are all especially dedicated and efficient. The decisions of the editors have been timely and scientifically based. I am also sure that editors would want me to thank all of the reviewers for their thoughtful evaluations. A large team is needed to make JDS successful. Thank you for your part, and please thank everyone else when you have a chance. When you visit the journal's website (http://www.journalofdairyscience.org/) to read JDS online, check out the "Featured Article" of the month or read the Interpretive Summaries. Much innovative information is available on a large variety of topics in dairy science.

Because the *Journal of Dairy Science* Most Cited Award is only in its second year, I will highlight it again here. The purpose of the award is to reward authors for contributing outstanding articles to the *Journal of Dairy Science*. Elsevier is currently contributing \$2,000 per year to fund the award. The FASS staff is assisting in collecting data on citations to determine the award recipients. More details of the criteria and recognition are identified below:

Authors of the most-cited articles published in *Journal of Dairy Science* are to be recognized at the annual meeting of the American Dairy Science Association.

Criteria are as follows:

- 1) For July 2012 recognition, the article was published during calendar year 2009. (For July 2013 recognition, article was published during calendar year 2010, and so on.)
- 2) Authors of four articles will be selected for recognition each year, one from each of the four sections of the journal: Dairy Foods; Physiology and Management; Nutrition, Feeding, and Calves; and Genetics and Breeding. (Articles published in the Our Industry Today section will be eligible for recognition within the science section that handled the peer-review process.)
- 3) Articles within section with the most citations from the date of publication to April 15 of the recognition year will be honored at the annual meeting of the American Dairy Science Association. Every article in the *Journal of Dairy Science* published during 2009 (or during 2010 for 2013) will have the opportunity for citations for more than two full years (all of 2010 and 2011 plus three months in 2012; citations after publication during 2009 will also be included in total citations).
- 4) All articles within a section are eligible.
- 5) Authors may be repeat winners if they authored different "most-cited" articles in different years or in different sections.

Recognition

- 6) Articles will be identified on the *Journal of Dairy Science* website as the most-cited articles within section published in 2009.
- 7) Corresponding authors will be recognized at the annual ADSA awards ceremony and on the ADSA award poster boards.
- 8) A check for USD \$500.00 for the most-cited article within each section will be presented to the corresponding author at the annual American Dairy Science Association awards ceremony

These new awards mean that you, as authors, now have at least one more reason to publish in the *Journal of Dairy Science*. Maybe you will be one of the recipients of the *Journal of Dairy Science* Most Cited Awards.

I look forward to seeing all of you at the annual meeting in Phoenix this July. If you are on the editorial board, plan on attending the editorial board breakfast in Phoenix. Pat yourself on the back for another great year for the *Journal of Dairy Science*, and thanks for being part of the team.

- Present and future opportunities for maximizing milk fat and protein yields

Income

As of December 31, 2011, the ADSA Foundation had a net income of \$16,704 for the year, due primarily to the Discover Conference program under the leadership of Larry Miller and Molly Kelley.

S-PAC

Through the efforts of Ken Olson, S-PAC subscriptions continue to grow to a new high of 496 subscribers in December of 2011, up from 480 in December of 2010. S-PAC continues to produce net income to the Foundation, thereby contributing to the growth of the Foundation's unrestricted funds, and



S-PAC is now net positive, having recovered all expenditures made since start-up. S-PAC subscriptions now include 10 academic libraries; many more people are being reached through S-PAC than before. Nearly 30% of subscribers are outside the United States, with subscribers in 34 nations. Members also include 83 undergraduate students, 29 graduate students, and 3 postdoctoral candidates. S-PACcurrently contains 407 proceedings from 43 conferences, and efforts are being made to expand offerings related to dairy foods.

2012 JAM

The ADSA Foundation will continue to sponsor the SAD Quiz Bowl, the Foundation Scholar Awards, and the Genevieve Christensen Award at the 2012 Joint Annual meeting in Phoenix, Arizona.

Discover Conferences

Two very successful Discover conferences were held in 2011: Discover 21, *Improving Reproductive Efficiency of Lactating Dairy Cattle*, and Discover 22, *Milk Components: Opportunities for Maximizing Farm Gate Returns and Meeting Manufacturing Needs*. Both were well attended and received positive evaluations from attendees.

What's New With S-PAC®?

When was the last time you checked into S-PAC®? If it has been a while, you may find some recent additions that will attract your interest. We continue to add the most recent proceedings from our current partner conferences, but we have also been busy adding new conferences with an expanded subject matter offering to the line-up.

We recently enhanced our offerings in the dairy foods area by partnering with the North Central Industry Association (NCIA). Proceedings from their 2009, 2010, and 2011 conferences are now available. We would like to continue to expand the information that we have available in the dairy foods area. If you are aware of conferences that would be a good fit for S-PAC, please contact me. It is a win-win situation as S-PAC expands its offering and the conference gets added international exposure.

Speaking of which, our international offerings were also expanded recently with the inclusion of two new partners, the International Symposium on Dairy Cow Nutrition and Milk Quality and the International Association for Paratuberculosis (IAP). Proceedings from the Symposium that was sponsored in part by ADSA and held in Beijing, China, offer a wide range of topics that were covered by international experts. Every two to three years, the IAP hosts an International Colloquium on Paratuberculosis, one of the top conferences in the world for research on *Mycobacterium avium* ssp. *paratuberculosis* (MAP) and Johne's disease. The 2012 colloquium was held February 5–9 in Sydney, Australia. Proceedings from that meeting as well as the 2002, 2005, 2007, and 2009 colloquia are now available on S-PAC. These offerings, coupled with the Johne's Disease Integrated Program (JDIP) proceedings, which were already available, make S-PAC the premier website for Johne's disease information.

In addition to a listing of all current proceedings and the basic search tool, you will find a calendar of upcoming conferences and links to websites for many of them. ADSA members have access to our meeting abstracts, but S-PAC has so much more to offer. You can test drive the system at the special rate of \$5 for five days. This allows you full access to the system as many times as you would like during those five days, and you can sign up for this offer repeatedly. To sign up for the special offer or if you are ready to add S-PAC® to your information tool kit now, go to the "Subscribe to S-PAC" page and follow the links to the Federation of Animal Science Societies (FASS) e-commerce area to become an S-PAC subscriber. Subscription is open to the public; however, members of ADSA, ASAS, and PSA, as well as several partner organizations, may subscribe at member rates.

S-PAC is also a great resource for the classroom, and we strongly encourage student use. We do this in two ways. An Undergraduate Student rate of \$5 per year and a Graduate Student rate of \$10 per year are available to ADSA Student members, so the total cost for an undergraduate is \$10 per year and for a graduate student \$20 (ADSA student membership + S-PAC subscription). This provides access to S-PAC as well as the other member benefits. Few text books are this inexpensive, and none have the range and depth of current information available through S-PAC. The other convenient way S-PAC can be made available for students and other on-campus users is through an institutional library subscription. S-PAC is now available to academic libraries via an IP address range connection, offered under a SERU (a simple open licensing agreement) for only \$350 per year from day of sign-up. Even better, ADSA has taken the risk out of subscribing by offering a 30-day free trial. We only ask that librarians first register with SERU and then promote the trial to their animal science, dairy science, and veterinary departments and schools. Several institutions are now making S-PAC available on a campus-wide basis using this new option. We encourage you to check to see if your campus library is a subscriber; if not, please invite them to check it out.

ADSA Professional Member Satisfaction Survey

Late last year, ADSA conducted its first ever professional member satisfaction survey. Our special thanks to the 419 members who took the time to take the survey and provide comments to help us better meet member needs and improve ADSA products and services. Following are the highlights of the survey results.

How satisfied are you with your ADSA membership experience, overall? 90.5% were Extremely Satisfied or Somewhat Satisfied.

Likelihood that you'll still be an ADSA member 12 months from now? 92.8% responded Extremely High or High.

Likelihood that you would recommend ADSA to a colleague or co-worker? 84.6% responded Extremely High or High.

Are you aware of ADSA's recent efforts to speak for members in the public policy arena on issues of importance to the field?

65.5% responded that they were aware, and 94.5% responded that they were Extremely or Somewhat Satisfied with efforts made.

78.7% of members responding say the ADSA staff has been extremely helpful or somewhat helpful.

On a scale of 1 to 5, with 5 being extremely satisfied, ADSA products and services were rated, on average, as follows:

A number of professional members indicated that they had no experience with ADSA products and services. If you are one of those members, make this the year to get more from your ADSA membership!

The survey provided several opportunities for verbatim responses. These will be used as a source of ideas for improving products and services and better meeting member needs when the board, division, and branch leaders convene for strategic planning this summer. Our goal is to improve from this baseline measure. Please feel free to send suggestions to help us achieve that goal to peters@assochq.org at any time.

Highlights of the ADSA Benchmarking Study

As mentioned in the February letter to the members, ADSA undertook a benchmarking study designed to compare ADSA operations with that of similar associations/societies. The database used for this analysis was provided by the American Society of Association Executives (ASAE) and is composed of 8,000 reporting organizations that complete an extensive questionnaire using their IRS informational tax returns (Form 990). Following are the findings:

Overall Profitability: ADSA is 230% more profitable than the benchmark group.

Staff Efficiency: On a full-time equivalent (FTE) basis (combining the executive director, ADSA's independent contractors, and ADSA's extensive use of the FASS staff), ADSA's FTEs produce 58% more revenue and 256% more net income than the benchmark group.

Personnel Expense: Combining the executive director, ADSA's independent contractors, and FASS staff time, ADSA's total staffing expense is 18.6% below the benchmark group. If ownership fees (charged to the FASS founding societies during the study timeframe) are included, ADSA's total staffing expense plus ownership fees is still 11% below benchmark group.

Expense by Major Activity: Expenses for convention services are 6.8% below benchmark, those for membership services are 4.09% below benchmark, and general and administrative expense (which includes ownership fees) is 3.13% below benchmark.

Overall Financial Position: ADSA's total net assets are 10.1 % above benchmark.

This analysis suggests that FASS is a remarkable and mutually beneficial creation. It delivers low-cost (below market) services, high efficiencies, and great results by all key success measures that ADSA uses. That translates into ADSA's ability to hold the line on member dues, registration, subscriptions, and other fees, while also building the JDS Superfund to protect JDS and ADSA well into the future.

ADSA Exploring Enhanced South and Central American Programming

In an effort to better serve our current and future members in Central and South America, ADSA will be hosting an informational meeting at the Joint Annual Meeting (JAM) in Phoenix, Arizona. The purpose of this meeting is gauge interest in the future development of ADSA education programs targeted toward Central and South America. One concept under consideration is the development of a South American ADSA Branch. A South American Branch would develop dairy science programming in conjunction with existing animal and food science meetings currently being held in the region. Our objective is to support new dairy science-related educational programming, enhance student and professional networking, and provide professional leadership opportunities for our members in the region. The JAM informational meeting will be open to all including both students and professionals with interests in both dairy foods and production. For those with interests in participation and/or development of the meeting, contact Rich Erdman erdman@umd.edu. The specific time and location of the meeting in Phoenix will be announced later.

ADSA Midwest Branch Report

The 45th annual meeting of the Midwestern Section of the American Society of Animal Science and the Midwest Branch of the American Dairy Science Association was held March 19-21 at the newly opened Iowa Events Center in Des Moines, Iowa. This year's meeting had 976 registrants. The programs were arranged to accommodate 342 abstracts among the oral and poster sessions. Sixty-eight abstracts represented research papers presented in graduate (43) and undergraduate (25) competitions. Nine excellent symposia were given during the meeting, including the inaugural Allee Symposium for swine nutrition and management and the Schingoethe Appreciation Symposium for dairy cattle nutrition. The Midwest Academic Quadrathlon was again very successful with 13 teams competing in the lab practicum, oral presentation, written exam, and quiz bowl. The Young Scholar program was held for the third time for animal science students, in addition to the seventh year for dairy science students. Eight ASAS and three ADSA Young Scholar members of the Midwest region were invited to showcase their efforts for their recent or finishing PhDs. This year's keynote speaker was Richard Sellers, whose presentation was titled "Implementation of the Food Safety Modernization Act: Who's affected and what to do." Many thanks are extended to all the sponsors of the 2012 meeting events and program sessions. Newly elected board members of the ADSA Midwest Branch are Secretary David Carlson (Milk Products) and Director Dan Illg (Standard Dairy Consultants).
