### **Letter from the ADSA® President**

**Ken McGuffey** 



What an honor and, even more, what a responsibility to serve as president of ADSA. Our Association took on new meaning for me when I served as chair of the Centennial Planning Committee leading up to the ADSA Centennial in 2006. In 1906, 19 men met at the University of Illinois and formed the National Association of Dairy Instructors and Investigators. Ten years later, the outgrowth of that meeting became the American Dairy Science Association. In the ensuing 106 years, the American Dairy Science Association and its members have become change agents for the dairy industry. Each of us can take pride in the impact of ADSA on society simply by visiting our local grocery store and looking at the diversity of foods that contain dairy ingredients in the dairy case, in the frozen food section, and on the shelves.

The vision of those in 1906 could not have foretold the outcome. Annual meetings convened thought leaders from across the country and from all parts of the world to discuss and exchange ideas on various scientific disciplines of our industry. These ideas were tested back at the university and research institutes. Findings were reported at the annual meetings and published in the *Journal of Dairy Science*. Professors mentored students who became leaders in institutions, government agencies, and industry all over the world.

Today, members of ADSA address the challenges of food security in the next few decades. These were addressed in the MILK Symposium at the 2012 JAM in Phoenix. The world population is expected to reach nine billion in 2050. Most of the population growth will occur in areas of the world that are food insecure today. We need to double food production and 70% of that increase must come from improved efficiency throughout the food chain. Enter ADSA and other professional scientific organizations for our next challenge.

Institutional boards (Board of Directors, Board of Regents/Trustees, and so on) are responsible for governance and planning. Our Association, led by the Board of Directors, is well positioned and ready to continue its vision and mission. The Board is operating under the second year of its second five-year strategic plan. The ADSA Strategic Plan contains six goal areas each under the leadership of a director: *Journal of Dairy Science* (David McCoy), Meetings (Lou Armentano), Membership (Susan Duncan), International (Rich Erdman), Science Policy (Geoff Dahl, who is also chair of the 2013 JAM Program Committee), and Science Visibility (Rafael Jimenez-Flores). Each of these goal areas contains elements of current activities and what ADSA will be in 10 or more years from now. Members of the Executive Committee—Scott Rankin, Mike Schutz, Roger Shanks (editor-in-chief), Jim Linn (past-past president), Bob Roberts (past-president), and I—are charged with promoting leadership for current and future leaders of ADSA through seminars at the mid-year meeting and prior to meetings of the Board at JAM.

Peter Studney, our executive director, provides exceptional leadership and counsel to the Board on all business matters. Our fiscal position is strong and growing, thanks to his control of the budget. He keeps the Board within the limits allowed for 501(c)3 organizations. Most important, Peter is dedicated to the mission of ADSA. Cara Tharp, the ADSA executive assistant, keeps us on schedule and maintains our records of business.

Editor-in-Chief Roger Shanks projects a record of 7,400 pages for the *Journal of Dairy Science* in 2012. Along with this impressive quantity, the quality of science in the journal remains high: the most recent Impact Factor of 2.564, reported in June 2012, was an increase of 3% over the

previous year. The journal is ranked second by Impact Factor of 55 journals in the Agriculture, Dairy and Animal Science category for 2011, based on Impact Factor and remains the topranked journal by 5-year Impact Factor. As a side note, Roger Shanks reads every page of each issue before publication.

In the upcoming fourth quarter, you will receive reminders to renew your membership in ADSA. Calls for abstracts for JAM 2013 in Indianapolis will go out to scientists all over the world in late October. Your Board of Directors will continue to plan and direct the Vision and Mission of ADSA.

### **Discover Conference Series**



The **23rd ADSA Discover Conference**, *Bovine Immunology: The Intersection of Innate and Acquired Immunity*, was held May 29 to June 1, 2012, at the Eaglewood Resort and Spa, Itasca, Illinois. The themes for the 23rd Discover Conference were immune system effects on calf growth and health; innate immunity in the transition period; vaccine responsiveness; genetic variation in immune-related traits; and management interactions with immunity.

The total registration for the conference was 158, representing 10 countries, 32 US states, 32 universities, at least 55 companies/consulting groups, and several graduate students. Excellent support was provided by 13 sponsors, including 3 new Discover sponsors. The conference co-chairs were Chris Chase (South Dakota State University) and Barry Bradford (Kansas State University). The other program committee members were Amelia Woolums (University of Georgia), Matthew R. Waldron (University of Missouri), Lorraine M. Sordillo (Michigan State University), Clint Loest (New Mexico State University), and Monica Foote (Food and Drug Administration/Danascara Cheese).

The **24th ADSA Discover Conference**, *New Developments in Rumen Microbiology and Their Potential to Improve Animal Performance*, held September 10–13, 2012, at the Northern Illinois University Conference Center (Naperville, Illinois) was quite successful. Conference cochairs were Paul Weimer (USDA-ARS) and Jeffrey Firkins (The Ohio State University). The other program committee members were T. G. Nagaraja (Kansas State University); Todd Callaway (USDA-ARS); Monty Kerley (University of Missouri); Adegbola Adesogan (University of Florida); and Tim McAllister (Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, Alberta).
