The following modifications have been made to the Staff and Academic Reduction in Time (START) Program:

- Extension of the end date of the program to Dec. 31, 2010
- Adjustment of the 5 percent minimum reduction in time
- · Eligibility of probationary staff employees to participate in the program

ANR unit heads have the authority to approve all actions related to the START Program and should decide on the review and approval process.

Furlough exchange available for advisors and non-campus-based specialists

NR has received approval to implement the Furlough Exchange Program (FEP) for Cooperative Extension (CE) advisors and non-campus-based CE specialists who are subject to the Salary Reduction/Furlough Plan. The FEP allows eligible ANR academics to devote extra effort to research projects instead of using furlough time. In exchange for not being furloughed, individuals may charge an equivalent amount of effort to extramural funding, subject to granting agency approval. Individuals may elect to begin FEP on Jan. 1, 2010.

Individuals who elect to participate in this program will forfeit their furlough days and therefore will be expected to work during ANR/campus closures. During the period of FEP participation, furlough days forfeited may not be used for any other purpose, including additional consulting days.

CS Update

Switch to new Adobe Connect server now

The old "breeze" server is being retired so everyone using Adobe Connect should begin using the new Adobehosted server immediately. Access information, including your initial password is on your ANR Portal (my.ucanr.org) under My Links, Adobe Connect. Once logged into the new server, you can change your password by clicking on My Profile in the upper right of your Adobe Connect home page.

Recordings and published Adobe Presenter content on the old server are currently available on a virtual server and will continue to be accessible until the transfer is complete. A process is being developed to transfer old content to the new server at http://ucanr.org/connect (aka http://ucanr.org/connect (aka http://ucanr.org/connect (aka http://uc-d/na.4/acrobat.com). Powerpoint, MP3, JPEGs, SWF and FLV files that you have uploaded will not be transferred. They reside in specific meetings on the old server and you'll need to re-upload them after you create a new meeting room.

"Author" rights for Presenter files are no longer affordable (\$150/per person/year) on the new server. As a result, users of the Adobe Presenter add-in to PowerPoint will need to

publish to one generic account set up for that purpose. For details, please contact ANRConnectPro@ucdavis.edu for access information.

The ANR portal's Adobe Connect link also features an FAQ and more than 40 brief tutorials that demonstrate specific functions of both meetings and use of Adobe Presenter, an add-in to PowerPoint.

Nominations open for 2010 Pedro Ilic Awards

Mominations are open for the 2010 Pedro Ilic Awards, which honor dedication to small-scale farming. The deadline for nominations is Jan. 15.

The awards will be presented March 1 at the California Small Farm Conference in San Diego.

The awards are named for Fresno County small-scale farm advisor Pedro Ilic, whose untimely death in 1994 prompted the UC Small Farm Program to annually honor those who carry out his legacy of personal commitment to small-scale and family farming. Ilic was one of the original advisors when the Small Farm Program was established in 1979.

The annual awards honor an educator and a farmer who embody characteristics that helped make Ilic a success. Each honoree is chosen because he or she:

- Envisions what can be done and has the imagination, energy and intellect to translate that vision into a successful activity
- Is part of the solution, not of the problem; critical in thinking, but constructive in approach
- · Is an advocate and risk taker

- Is an effective teacher, instills self-esteem in others and constantly encourages others
- Is a dedicated professional who believes in his or her work
- Has determination, exuberance, high energy and genuine friendliness for all people, with the conviction that the smallest is as important as the biggest
- Has high personal and family values

Last year's honorees were Dan Macon, an innovative Placer County rancher, and Jim Leap, farm manager for UC Santa Cruz Center for Agroecology and Sustainable Food Systems.

Nominations are reviewed by a committee from the UC Small Farm Program and UC Cooperative Extension in Fresno County, as well as associates of Pedro Ilic.

Heidi von Geldern joined Contracts & Grants as federal subaward analyst on Oct. 13.





Small Farm Conference set for Feb. 28 to March 2 in San Diego

ore than 400 small-scale farmers and their supporters are expected to attend the 2010 California Small Farm Conference, Feb. 28 to March 2 in San Diego. Keynote speakers for the event will include USDA Deputy Secretary Kathleen Merrigan, LA Times food columnist Russ Parsons and SlowFood USA President Josh Viertel.

New topics addressed in workshops will include social media marketing for farms, restaurant partnerships with farmers markets, urban beekeeping, alternative energy options and niche crops such as coffee and tea. The conference will include 25 workshops in five tracks organized around resource management, marketing, production strategies, farmers market management and agricultural hot topics.

Short courses at this year's conference will address topics related to greenhouse production, water conservation strategies,

agritourism, organic certification and value-added products at farmers markets.

ANR experts, including Ramiro Lobo, Penny Leff, Mark Gaskell, Ben Faber and Shermain Hardesty are organizing tours and workshops on topics from new crops to agritourism to niche meat production. Hardesty and Linda Vieira serve on the conference's board of directors.

Scholarships are available for farmers, ranchers, farm workers, market managers and agricultural students. Scholarship applications are due Jan. 8. Early registration is \$100 and ends Jan. 15.

Register trips for travel insurance and security protection benefits

The university provides travel insurance and assistance for all ANR employees traveling out of state or out of country on UC business. While this insurance coverage is always available, travelers must register their travel information to use the services.

Coverage also extends to spouses, domestic partners and dependents when traveling with university employees as personal travelers. The benefits include Security Extraction, Medical Evacuation and Travel Assistance, in addition to other services.

Unfortunately, only a small percentage of UC travelers complete their online travel profile, which contains key emergency contact and travel itinerary information. Failure to enter this information may result in communication delays or difficulties in the event of an emergency.

When OP-based employees book work-related travel through UC Travel (www. travel.ucla.edu), the travel insurance registration is automatically transmitted to iJET.

Employees who use Davisbased systems (such as MyTravel) or book their own travel using Connexus or any other system, must register their trips at http://www.uctrips-insurance.org.

Registered UC travelers will receive direct e-mail notices from iJET/Worldcue regarding political unrest, natural disasters, war activities, health warnings, etc. The iJET/Worldcue system notifies ANR Risk Services about travelers and their itineraries, thus providing critical information in the event of an emergency.

Larry L. Strand

Larry L. Strand retired Dec. 5 after 25 years as UC Integrated Pest Management Program's principal editor.

Strand came to UC Davis in 1976 as a postgraduate research scientist in the departments of Plant Pathology, Vegetable Crops and Pomology from



1976 to 1984, working with Joe Ogawa, Shang Fa Yang, John Labavitch, and Leonard Morris.

In 1984, he joined UC IPM. Working with UC specialists and advisors, Strand researched, wrote and revised integrated pest management manuals for specific crops. He also worked closely with photographers to obtain photos for IPM products and supervised the UC IPM photo collection.

"Larry Strand pulled together a number of the classic UC IPM manuals," said Frank Zalom, UC Davis entomology specialist who was UC IPM director for 16 years. "His low-key approach coupled with solid academic credentials and a true understanding of IPM made him a pleasure to work with, and the quality of the products speak for themselves.

"Most people probably don't know that Larry spent many hours in the field with Jack Kelly Clark to help produce the unique photo catalog that will remain a key resource for UC extension publications for years to come," Zalom added. "Larry cared for the photo collection, painstakingly inventorying Jack's photos so that they can be readily accessed. Larry also became an excellent photographer in his own right."

Strand earned his B.S. in zoology and his Ph.D. in plant pathology & biochemistry from Oregon State University. He worked as a postdoctoral research scientist at the Boyce Thompson Institute for Plant Research in Yonkers, NY prior to coming to UC.

Lindcove REC combined its annual citrus tasting with a lab dedication and a 50th anniversary celebration on Dec. 11. VP Dooley and AVP Barbara Allen-Diaz, shown tasting fruit, were among the participants. Dooley said Lindcove's working relationship with the citrus industry and growers is a perfect example of a successful UC partnership with the private sector that is yielding results, not just for citrus growers but for all of those folks who love to eat the fruit.

In Memoriam



Lon Clair Christensen

Lon Clair Christensen, community development specialist emeritus, died Nov. 16 in Davis. He was 81.

Christensen was born in Thatcher, Utah, and was a member of 4-H and FFA. While earning a bachelor's degree in agronomy from Utah State University, Christensen

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raised 5,000 turkeys each year to help pay his way. He also earned a master's degree in economics from North Carolina State University. He began his career as an extension specialist for Utah State and then University of Nevada. He worked for UC Cooperative Extension as a rural community development specialist based at UC Davis from 1972 until retiring in 1997.

Christensen was the executive director of the California Rural Affairs Council. He was also a task force chairman for the Small Farm Viability Project report of 1977, and directed the development of the Small Farm Program for nearly a decade. He helped organize the first California Small Farm Conference in 1982, now convening for its 23rd year.

"Clair always tried to do things the nice way," said former colleague Manuel Jimenez, Tulare County small farm advisor. "He had a way of trying to wedge himself into other groups, bringing them into the loop to help small farmers throughout the state. He was not just trying to make a program work; his heart was in it, his soul."

He is survived by his wife of 57 years, Verona Christensen, their three sons and a daughter, 20 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
