



1862 Morrill Act Creates Land Grant Universities





Over 1.7 million acres of unceded Tribal lands throughout California were used to support 32 **Land Grant** institutions in 27 states, including the University of California.







FY 2015-16 staff salaries averaged 29% below market rate and UCCE Advisors' salaries were 9.3% below market rate.

Several cycles of Market Adjustment Plan has now pushed employee's compensation to labor market midpoints.











Over \$45 million recently acquired for new capital projects and to fix deferred maintenance.

Over \$2 million to improve broadband access means that UCCE offices and RECS throughout California are now able to do their work more effectively.


















Expanded and Diversified UC ANR's Funding Portfolio




19 UCCE Academics & 25 ANR


