Bring	g your own saddle pad.	POSSIBLE	SCORE
1.	Check saddle pad carefully for cleanliness and burrs. Place saddle pad up on the horse's back, several inches forward, then pull it towards the rear. (English riders can place both saddle and pad on the horse at the same time if the pad is the type that attaches to the saddle.)	2	
2.	Check saddle for signs of wear or disrepair. Check fleece for burrs.	2	
3.	Place the right stirrup, etc. over the seat of the saddle. If the stirrups are short, it is better to loop the right stirrup over the saddle horn so it won't swing free and hit the horse. Place saddle evenly and gently on pad. Recheck positions of pad. (English riders should remember to leave the irons tied up during saddling.)	2	
4.	Walk around the off side of the horse, pull the stirrup down (English riders leave irons tied up), and the cinches, and see that nothing is twisted. Be careful not to allow cinch ring to strike the horse's knee.	2	
5.	The saddle should be just slightly forward of where you want it, so grasp the horn and pommel and shake it back into position. Next make an "air pocket" between the pad and the withers.	2	<del></del>
6.	Adjusted front and back cinches to fit individual horse.	2	
7.	Put the left stirrup up, over the horn or the saddle seat (English riders lift left flap) and reach under the belly with the left hand for the cinch using whatever method you normally use.	2	
8.	Remember to cinch up in two or three stages. Tighten the cinch just enough so the saddle won't slip, walk the horse about a dozen steps; then tighten the cinch again.	2 .	····
9.	Fastened the rear cinch last and checked to make sure it was neither too loose nor too tight. (Since English riders do not have a back cinch, they should check to make sure that the irons are still tied securely.)	2 .

1	Check headstall, chinstrap, and rein leather for damage.	2

6	Buckle throat latch and place end in keeper. (English riders buckle throat latch and cavesson placing ends in keepers.) Check for correct fit.	2

1.	Check throat latch, and chin (cavesson/noseband) strap for adjustment.	2	
2.	Cinch (girth) properly checked and tightened.	2	
3.	(Lower both stirrup irons.) Reins placed over the horse's head and adjusted evenly in left hand to hold horse with romal or end of the reins on the right side of the horse.	2	
4.	Place left hand on withers. Riders may grasp a handful of mane if necessary. Turn to face horse's hindquarters.	2	
5.	Grasp stirrup (stirrup iron) with right hand and twist it toward you.	2	
6.	Place left foot in stirrup (stirrup iron) on ball of foot, pivot on right foot to face horse.	2	
7.	Grasp the saddle horn (pommel) with the right hand and mount smoothly, passing right leg over horse. (If cantle is used to mount subtract one point.)	2	
8.	Slip right foot into right stirrup (stirrup iron). (Feet should rest in irons so that the ball of the foot rests on the stirrup pad with the little toe resting against outside of iron.)	2	
9.	If a romal is used, it should be moved to the right side of the horse after mounting. Ends of split reins should remain on the same side as the hand holding the reins when rider uses finger between reins. (Excess rein should be moved to the right side of the horse after mounting. Reins should be adjusted for light contact on the horse's mouth.)	2

1.	Gather up reins. Romal should be moved to left side of horse before dismounting. (Hold reins so there is enough contact to keep the horse still. Reins placed in left hand.)	2	
2.	Loosen right foot in stirrup (loosen both feet from stirrup irons).	2	
3.	Grasp horn (pommel) with right hand. Left hand holds reins and rests on withers.	2	
4.	Brace left knee, stand straight up, and swing right leg over horse gently, close to horse without hitting the horse (swing right leg over horse, supporting with hands).	2	
5.	Loosen left foot in stirrup and step down facing the horse's head (lower with hands, pushing away from horse).	2	<del></del>
6.	Remove left foot smoothly from stirrup (remove reins over the horse's head).	2	
7.	Remove reins over the horse's head. Move to the front of the horse holding the reins (tie stirrup irons up and move to the front of the horse holding reins)	2

1.	Unbuckled the back cinch first. (English riders checked to make sure irons are securely tied.)	2	
2.	Uncinch the front cinch. Let the cinches down carefully, not hit- ting the horse.	2	
3.	Put the right stirrup and cinches up, over the horn or the saddle seat.	2	
4.	When taking the saddle off, lift it above the horse's withers, and then off his back. Do not drag it over the withers which can irritate the horse.	2	
5.	Remove the saddle pad separately. (English riders who have a pad that attaches to the saddle can remove saddle and pad together.)	2
