4-H Policy and Information Update December, 2012

As we approach the new year and reflect on the current year's accomplishments let us remember the value of the 4-H program has to the lives of 4-H members all throughout Los Angeles County. Through the 4-H program leaders have given amazing gifts to youth. They have given friendship, guidance, support, wisdom and yes, love. Taken together, these gifts represent providing a sense of belonging (one of the 4-H Essential Elements).

Researchers have determined that youth learn best when given the supports and opportunities to learn in a safe place and space. That is, the emotional and physical environment has to be a place where the well-being of youth matters and is validated by caring adults (belonging). The language used, the arrangement of the physical space and the activities offered validate youth (belonging). Belonging suggests that youth feel welcomed and that they are a part of something meaningful, supportive and safe. Belonging gives youth a sense of mutual commitment to an ideal of community that 4-H fosters.

Think about Belonging each time you engage a 4-H member in a project activity, help a youth prepare a speech or demonstration or welcome a new family to the program. Going forward into the new year, give special consideration to the essential element of belonging. Continue to make belonging an important part of the 4-H experience and give youth that sense of connection to something greater than themselves

Flame-Leaf Flower

During the holiday season, we have all seen the bright red flowers that seem to be everywhere – poinsettias. As you can probably imagine, like many special flowers, the poinsettia has a long and interesting history reaching all the way back to the ancient Aztec society in Mexico. Poinsettias were actually first brought to the United States by Joel Robert Poinsett in 1825.



Poinsett was the U.S. Ambassador to Mexico, and was so very impressed by the "Flame Flower" that he brought a few cuttings back to the United States, where poinsettias were eventually propagated by a man who worked in a Pennsylvania nursery named Robert Buist.

Ancient Aztecs found the "flame flower" fascinating and found many more uses for it than just marveling at its beauty. Even old King Montezuma liked the flower so much he would have horse-drawn carts by the dozens filled with poinsettias brought to into the city to "liven" things up. The sap of the poinsettia was used by Aztecs to treat high fevers and is now used to make what we know as "latex."

What story about a red flame beauty would be complete without a little Hollywood magic in the shadows? Albert Ecke arrived in Los Angeles from his European home in the 20s where he attempted to grow fruits and vegetables, and raise a few dairy cattle. When Ecke discovered the beautiful red flower, he thought it would be great for landscaping. Poinsettias lined Hollywood roads during that time, and Ecke's family ranch boomed with their sales. Now, most poinsettias around the world come from California (80%) with over 90% of the flowering poinsettias having originated at the Ecke Ranch. During the holiday season, 65 million are sold nationwide.

The red "flowers" of the poinsettia are actually just red modified leaves called "bracts." Bracts can come in red, pink, white, yellow, orange, green, ivory, and there are also some that are marbled. There are even breeds called "Jingle Bells" and "Candy Cane." The true flowers are small, yellow, and mostly insignificant. The flowers and red bracts appear as a result of the shortening days and lengthening nights in the Fall. Poinsettias can be forced to produce flowers and red bracts by artificially manipulating the length of the night (Courtesy of Don Hodel, Environmental Horticulture Advisor, UC Cooperative Extension, Los Angeles).



Poinsettias of days of old used to be grown outdoors, but are now primarily grown in greenhouses. Poinsettia bushes can grow up to ten feet tall in nature, but are mostly grown and sold in pots around the holidays. Poinsettias go up in price depending on how many blooms they have (the more the better). There are now over 100 varieties of poinsettias to choose from.



Here are some tips for keeping your poinsettias happy and healthy:

- When you first bring home your poinsettia during the holiday season, place your poinsettia indoors where it will get some sun (perhaps a window), but not too much.
- Do not overwater your poinsettia; wait until the soil feels mostly dry before you water it again.
- Poinsettias do best in 65-75 degree temperatures.
- When cutting your poinsettia back, do so in June or July, and do not cut below 4 inches.
- June or July is also a good time to transplant if you are going to do so.
- If you are replanting your poinsettia, replant in soil mixed with peat.
- Poinsettias need room to grow, so plant them with enough space for them to "stretch out." If you are buying a poinsettia in the store, make sure it is not overcrowded in its pot (or it won't make it long).
- Move your poinsettia from indoors to outdoors in June (partial sun).
- Fertilize and water your plant through the summer.
- In October, move your plant back inside in a sunny window during the day. Keep it in complete darkness during the evening hours (in order to bloom for the holiday season).
- You can leave your poinsettia in the sunny window starting in November until the holidays arrive.
- **Enjoy!**

December 12 is *National Poinsettia Day*, and so we celebrate this red-flame flower and its beauty on that day, but also throughout the holiday season. Be on the lookout for beautiful and rare poinsettias you may never have seen before. - USDA Provides Tips to Establish a School Garden and Integrating it into School Operations
 From three by four foot raised beds to multi-acre mini-farms, school gardens across the country are
 sprouting, growing, and thriving. Both research and anecdotal evidence show that kids are more likely to try
 and like foods that they've been exposed to through garden-based learning, and school gardens provide the
 opportunity for instructors to present academic lessons and teach important life skills. In addition to being
 integrated into health, science, math, and even English curricula, many school gardens are incorporated into
 afterschool and culinary learning programs, and some even supply food to the school cafeteria. So how do
 you establish a school garden, integrate it into school operations, and use the harvest?
 - In 2009, USDA launched The People's Garden Initiative, a collaborative of local and national organizations working together to establish community and school gardens across the country. The People's Garden website offers links to how-to webinars, garden-based curricula, and financial and technical resources, as well as a map that plots school and community gardens across the country. Also worth checking out is this list of resources from the organization Life Lab; the KidsGardening website from the National Gardening Association; The Edible Schoolyard Project's resource search tool for teachers, parents, and advocates; and this toolkit from the Alliance for a Healthier Generation.

- Finding the staff time to keep school gardens productive and in use is often one of the biggest challenges. Luckily, there are lots of people and organizations eager to help. FoodCorps, a service organization supported by the Corporation for National and Community Service, deploys AmeriCorps volunteers to schools to help build gardens, teach children about food and nutrition, and source local ingredients for school meals; click here to see whether there are service members in your state. Local organizations and local chapters of national organizations like Future Farmers of America, 4-H, the Cooperative Extension Master Gardener Program, the National Gardening Association, and Slow Food USA can also be a great resource.
- To learn more about serving foods produced in school gardens through the Federal Child Nutrition Programs, and about purchasing school gardening supplies using school food service account funds, see this memo published by USDA's Food and Nutrition Service in 2009.
- How can you be sure that food produced in the garden is safe for kids to eat? <u>This page</u> from the National Agricultural Library and Team Nutrition and <u>this fact sheet</u> from the National Food Service Management Institute provide links and tips for keeping garden foods safe from soil to plate.
