Resources: All of the above! I used the starred resources most often.

Tools: Green plant-Velcro for tying up tomatoes and other vines. Brilliant!  
My favorite hand trowel. It's funky, but a dear old friend.

Tricks: Low-budget trellis made of tree stakes and concrete reinforcing wire grids.  
Flagstones as movable stepping stones for weeding and plant care in beds.  
Old wire fencing or branch prunings crisscrossed on ground to deter visiting  
“poopers”!
