

Who sued whom?

In early April 2024, a coalition that includes the Pajaro Valley Federation of Teachers, Safe Ag Safe Schools, Center for Farmworker Families, Monterey Bay Central Labor Council, and Californians for Pesticide Reform—represented by Earthjustice—filed a lawsuit against Monterey County's Agricultural Commissioner and the California Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR)









What did the lawsuit allege?

- The plaintiffs argued that regulators illegally approved permits for the use of fumigants, specifically chloropicrin and 1,3-dichloropropene (1,3-D), near several schools—Ohlone Elementary, Pajaro Middle School, and Hall District Elementary—without:
 - Considering safer alternatives
 - Properly evaluating cumulative health impacts or
 - Providing a meaningful, documented environmental review, as required under state law and the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)





Court Ruling

- Monterey County judge, Thomas Wills, ruled in favor of the state regulator (DPR), upholding the pesticide permits, finding:
 - The county's Agricultural Commissioner had indeed considered alternatives and environmental impacts.
 - California law allows county officials to issue permits without engaging in lengthy analysis
- This outcome reflects a robust and functioning regulatory system.

What comes next?

- Appeal: The plaintiffs have a two-month window to appeal. Their team is currently deciding whether to pursue that route.
- Broader Impacts: The case is already being watched for its potential to set statewide precedent regarding how rigorously agricultural agencies must assess health risks before approving pesticide use near schools

California splits responsibility for the enforcement of pesticide laws between two regulatory bodies: DPR and the County Agricultural Commissioners (CACs). At the state level, a pesticide must be registered by DPR before it can be sold or used in California. As part of the registration process, DPR must evaluate potential risks

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

The U.S. PRO – Circular Action Alliance

- Circular Action Alliance (CAA) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit PRO dedicated to implementing effective EPR laws for paper and packaging in the U.S.
- CAA was founded by 20 companies from the food, beverage, consumer goods, and retail industries.
- CAA has been approved to be the single PRO in California, Colorado, and Minnesota. CAA was the only PRO to submit an Oregon program plan.











































CAA's Mission


 CAA's mission is to help producers comply with EPR laws, deliver harmonized, best-inclass services and work with governments, businesses and communities to reduce waste and recycle more.

CAA will:

- Meet state-specific regulatory requirements;
- Leverage existing recycling systems and infrastructure; and
- Advance the circularity of covered materials through collaboration with local governments, service providers, and recycling system interest holders.







NAW's lawsuit alleges that with this law Oregon unconstitutionally:

- Delegates control over the EPR program, including the setting of fees wholesaler-distributors must pay to a private, third-party group (the Circular Action Alliance (CAA)), with a financial interest in the program without clear rules or oversight.
- Unfairly targets out-of-state producers, disrupts national markets, and tries to control business outside of Oregon—violating the U.S. Constitution's limits on state regulation of
- Mandates producers sign contracts with a single approved private organization (CAA) giving up their economic freedom and due process rights.
- · Subjects producers to fees and rules set by CAA without a real chance to object or appeal or




USFWS: Monarch Listing

- The monarch was petitioned to be listed as a threatened species in 2014
- In 2020, it was determined that listing is Warranted but Precluded by higher priority listings
 - This finding was challenged in court
- On December 12, 2024, the monarch was *proposed for listing* as a <u>threatened species</u>
 - A species does not receive full protection under ESA until a final rule has been published







Monarch Butterfly Migration

A spike in alerts concerning the monarch butterflies, especially related to their migration to the West coast and fears of their dwindling numbers.




