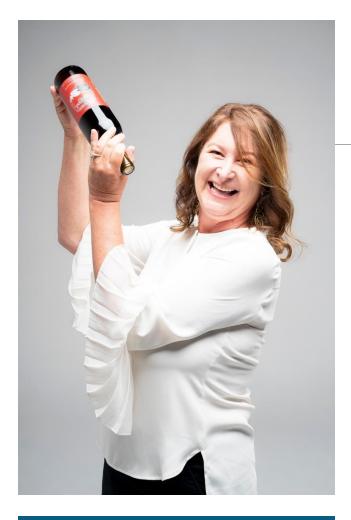

History of the RVVA

- 2002: 14 locals meet at someone's home to form the core of the RVVA.
- Early days: 1 bonded winery and <50 amateur vineyards in Ramona; joined in 2005.
- RVVA Presidents have included Bill Schweitzer, Rich McClellan, John York, Micole Moore, Susanne Sapier, and now Sue Robinson.
- 2006: Ramona Valley becomes an official AVA.
- 2010: RVVA helps pass the Boutique Winery Ordinance, allowing small wineries to offer tastings.
- Today: Hundreds of vineyards and many wineries; RVVA leads on community, education, sustainability, and industry leadership, with membership from all over San Diego County.

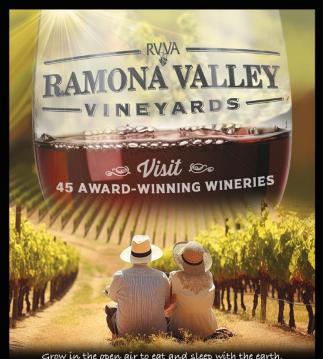

This boosts traffic, reaches new customers, and expands brand awareness across a wider region.







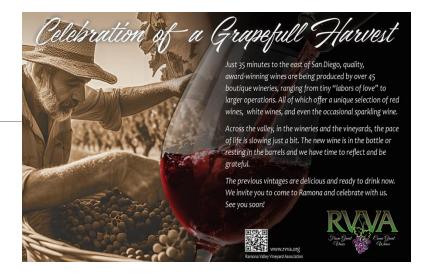

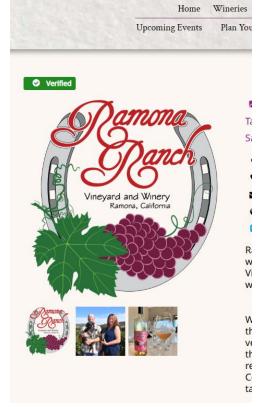












There is real power in working together.

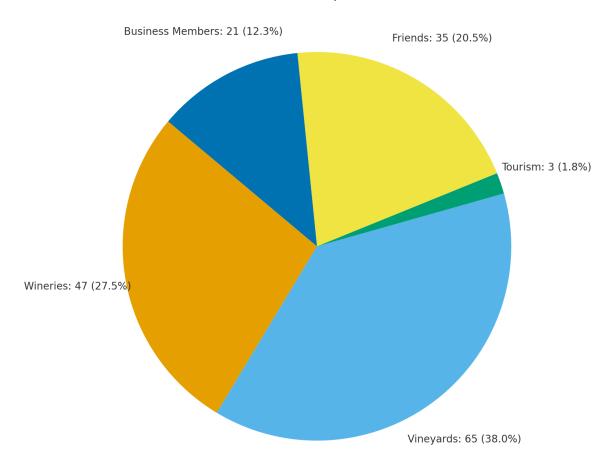
Access to Education, Training & Best Practices

Farm and winery regulations; currently working on updates to the SD Winery Ordinance, engaging with SD Planning and PDS Staff

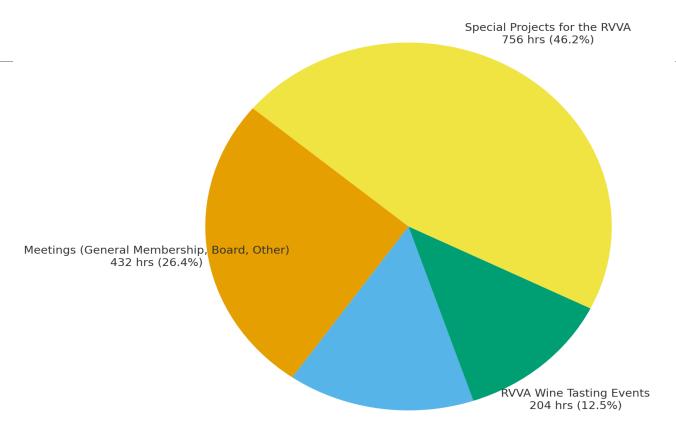
Land-use policies; providing a unified voice on potential restrictions and regulations

This keeps small businesses competitive and sustainable.



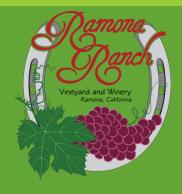












Support for Sustainable & Responsible Tourism
