Resource Conservation Districts:

- RCDs are non-regulatory, independent special districts
- There are 97 RCDs throughout California-each covers a different geographic territory
- RCDs are primarily funded through competitive grants but some RCDs also receive funding from local property taxes, fee for service work, and private donations.
- Rely on partnerships with landowners, tribes, conservation organizations, other RCDs, and local, state, and federal agencies



What RCDs Do:

- Provide assistance to communities to voluntarily conserve, protect, and restore wild and working landscapes
- Provide technical and educational assistance to property owners/managers
- Connect landowners to resources we are NOT funders
