Leaves are falling. It's time to make leaf mulch, mold, or compost.

Leaves have some nutritional value for plants, although they are not nutritional powerhouses. Instead of putting them in the landfill, use them to mulch your garden now or make leaf mold for next year's use. First, don't use walnut or eucalyptus as they may harm plants. Gather leaves from your trees, such as Mulberry, and shred them using either a lawnmower with a bag, or a leaf vacuum with a bag. You can put them in a garbage can and use a weed eater on them as well. Once they are shredded, spread the leaf mulch as you would any mulch. As the leaves decompose, they will add nutrients to the soil. Put them around the base of perennials to insulate the roots. This works best if the perennials are cut back for the winter. If you want to make leaf mold, then shred the leaves, place in a black plastic bag, poke a few holes in it, and set it in out of the way. Don't let it dry out completely. Check it after 6 months or a year, and you should have materials to use around trees and bushes. This will help the soil retain moisture. You can also use leaves in your compost pile whether you are hot composting or just letting the pile decompose slowly. No matter which method you choose, it's better for the environment than sending all those leaves to the landfill.
