HELP STOP THE SPREAD OF INVASIVE SPECIES.


Our forests are threatened by nonnative insects and diseases. Many of these pests can be transported long distances on firewood. Once transported to new areas, these invasive species can become established and kill large numbers of trees and shrubs.

The Polyphagous Shot Hole Borer (PSHB) has been found in several Southern California counties. This wood boring beetle spreads a fungus that causes Fusarium dieback disease. This beetle/fungus combination is capable of causing damage to over 100 species of forest, landscape, and agricultural trees, including native trees like oaks, sycamores, and cottonwoods. Help us contain this destructive pest by keeping firewood local and becoming informed. To learn more, go to www.pshb.org.

When buying firewood for camping or home use:

- Do not move firewood from location to location
- Obtain firewood from a source local to your home or camping destination.
- Buy or collect only what you will need, and burn responsibly.
