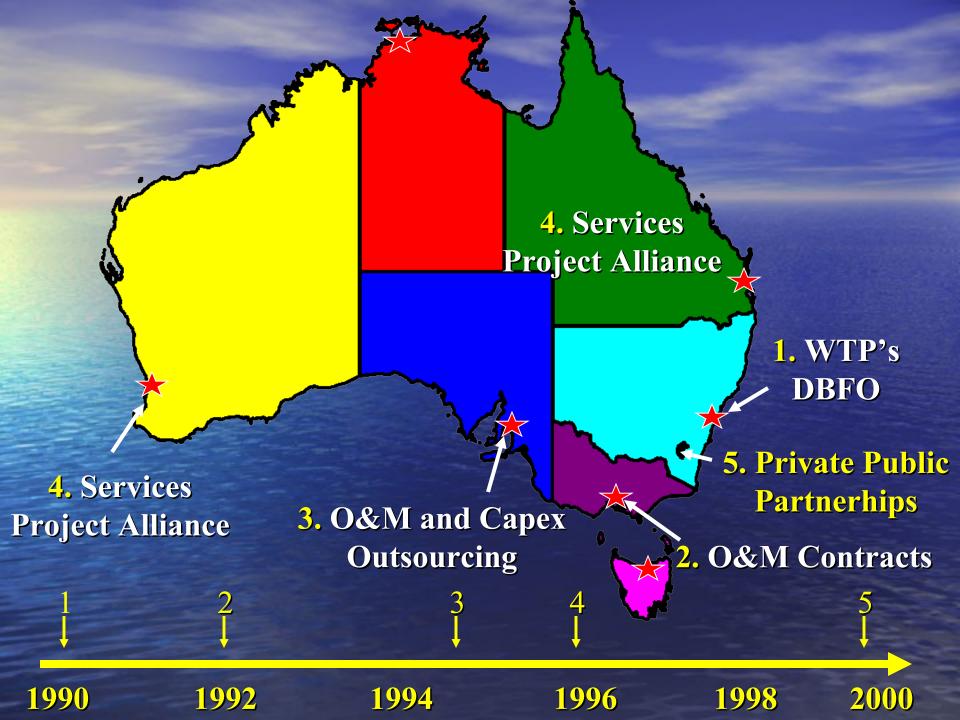

- Noordwijk/UNCSD/Jo'burg Water Focus
- Recommendations:
 - Government role in regulation not operation
 - More private sector involvement
 - Integrated catchment management
 - Integrated potable water/sanitation programs
 - Appropriate pricing systems/externalities
 - Institutional strengthening
 - Appropriate technology

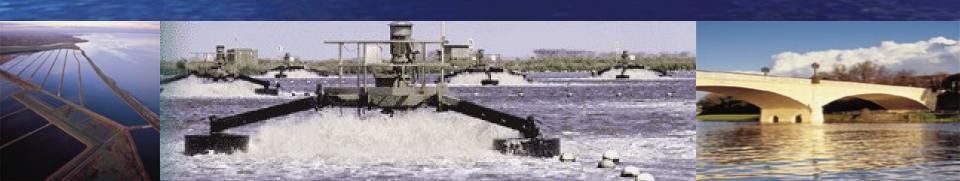
Australian Water Reform

- 1990 competition policy approach
- 1991 Electricity with separate generation/transmission/retail systems
- 1994 Water: initial focus on urban water
- State utilities below benchmark
 - Technical
 - Financial
 - Managerial



Victorian Experience

- Implemented wide reform in water industry
 - 120 water authorities pared down to 3 urban and 15 rural bodies
 - Over a billion dollars invested, use of PPPs, D&C, BOO/BOOT etc
- Partnerships Victoria



Other States

- Corporatised main water body
 - Queensland the exception
- Sydney led reform drive (3 X DBFO)
- Melbourne followed (DBFO and outsourcing)
- SA used leveraging/outsourcing
- WA project alliance outsourcing
- PPP model: ACTEW and NQ Water
- ONE SIZE DOESN'T FIT ALL







Broader Water Reform Status

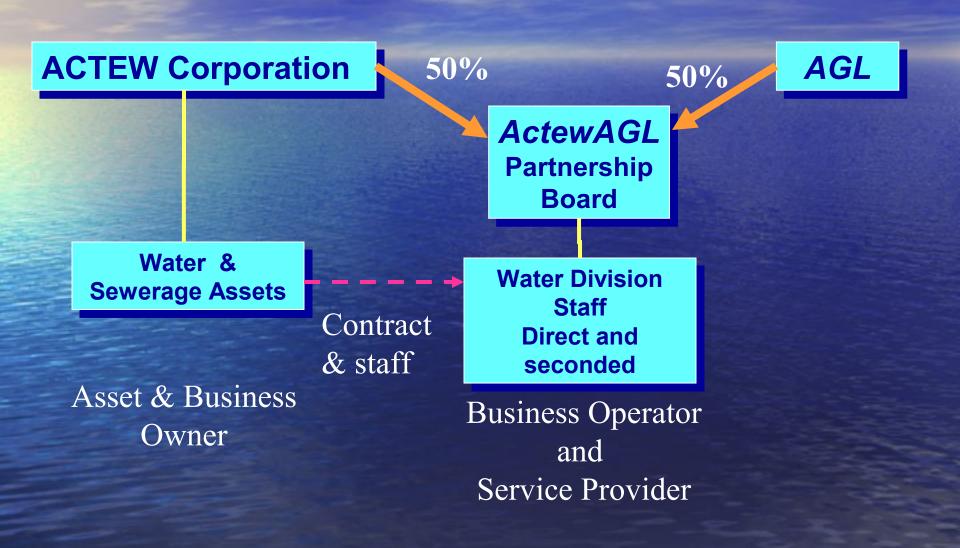
- Most effort and finance in urban systems
- Rural catchment reform slower
- MDBC led in trans-boundary issues
- Current extreme drought new impetus
- People want government to pay

PPPs: A Hybrid Model

ACT challenges:

- Multi-utility
- Risks in the energy market
- Operational efficiency
- Demand for capital
- Privatisation failed
- ACTEW/AGL JV 2000
 - ACTEW remains holding company, ActewAGL operating company

PPPs in ACT

- ACTEW involved in 4 types of PPP
 - Equity partnership electricity/gas (AGL)
 - Alliance contracting water/sewerage
 - Strategic investor TransACT
 - Vehicle for investment technology









Progress

- Trend to project alliances, DBO and DBFO
- Need for TBL and community engagement
- Government owned status: barrier
- Management focus on outcomes not ownership
- PPPs offer advantages
- Have achieved first generation reforms
