Training Class Overview

Master Gardener Commitments

Course overview: 18-week course

Approximately 70-hour commitment Proposed start: January 11, 2025 Proposed end: May 31, 2025

- 1. In-person sessions about three times per month on Saturdays, typically 9am Noon. Locations throughout Santa Barbara County.
- 2. Weekly reading and/or lecture. Lectures primarily pre-recorded, though some will be live via Zoom.

Lectures and in-person sessions led by UC and local experts. Proposed topics include:

- Horticulture
- · Soil and fertilizer management
- Water management
- Pest control (IPM)
- Entomology
- Plant pathology and plant problem diagnosis
- · Weed management
- Vertebrate pests
- Common garden plants: vegetables, citrus, avocado, roses, berries, grapes
- Native plants

As a master gardener, you are required to volunteer hours in support of our mission. In addition, you will be required to complete continuing education to stay current on the latest research and best practices.

First year commitment: 50 volunteer hours On-going commitment: 25 volunteer hours, 12 continuing education hours
