4-H County Ambassadors are role models for their fellow 4-H members, their county, and their community.

A Working Honor

County Ambassador teams plan their own year of activities to create meaningful learning and service opportunities for themselves and others in their communities.

Being chosen as a County Ambassador is a working honor and in fulfilling it, members are expected to behave with a degree of maturity, composure and excellence.

Annual Plan of Action

<u>County Ambassadors develop an annual Plan of Action that includes choosing</u> <u>and developing three leadership competencies and completing one service</u> <u>learning project.</u>

County Ambassadors choose from six leadership competencies: Advise, Advocate, Mentor, Plan, Promote, Teach

San Luis Obispo County 4-H Ambassador Program Coach

County Ambassador coaches will serve at least a one-year term, with eligibility for reappointment each year.

Applicants will go through an application and selection process and become a 4-H Adult Volunteer prior to serving as a Coach.

The application process for returning coaches is to submit Intent to Continue as a coach by the Extended County Deadline June 21st, 2024 and go through the selection process.

Coach Role

The Coach's role is one of partnering and collaborating with County Ambassadors to implement best practices in positive youth development.

Best practices include but are not limited to: setting group agreements at the beginning of the term as to how the group will function, facilitating educational components of the program and allowing youth to facilitate meetings and rotating leadership responsibility.

A Coach should be flexible when working with County Ambassadors.

Also, depending on the County's program, being a Coach could involve significant time commitments.

Coaches are expected to:

- Chaperone events and conferences when County Ambassadors are present.
- Partner with the County Ambassador team to coordinate meetings.
- Provide guidance to and collaborate with the County Ambassador team to ensure the team has clear, reasonable and attainable goals.

• Facilitate good communications between the coaches and the team, as well as between team members.

• Ensure that the team considers possible resources, including content experts, to accomplish the team's goals.

• Be knowledgeable of 4-H policies and ensure that the policies are followed. (The UCCE 4-H Community Education Specialist or 4-H Regional Program Coordinator are a resource for policy interpretations.)



4-H CLUB NEWS — CAMBRIA 4-H CLUB

4-H Youth Make a Difference: "Celebrating a Successful Cambria Trash-a-thon!" By: Gale Feldman

Cambria 4-H would like to extend our heartfelt thanks to all who supported and contributed to our recent Trash-a-thon event! The enthusiasm and dedication of our 19 4-H members, parents, leaders, and our honorary participant Cedrick the goat, made this initiative a resounding success. Together, we took on the challenge of cleaning Cambria's East and West Village and achieved remarkable results—collecting an impressive 35 pounds of trash, totaling 704 pieces.

Using the Clean Swell app, we meticulously cataloged the litter we encountered, revealing significant findings. Notably, we retrieved 189 cigarette butts, 176 food-related items (including bottles, caps, utensils, cups, plates, and containers, with 79 food wrappers being the most abundant), 170 miscellaneous items like aluminum foil, paper, and wipes, and 86 small plastic and foam pieces. This count likely underestimates our actual impact, as our participants' enthusiasm for cleaning the village often outpaced our ability to report each discarded item collected.

The importance of collecting this litter cannot be overstated, particularly in our coastal community. Removing trash from our streets and shores helps safeguard wildlife and preserves the natural beauty of our coastal ecosystems.

We are deeply grateful to all who have donated to support our 4-H program and initiatives like the Trash-athon. Your contributions empower our youth and sustain our efforts to create a cleaner, greener future for Cambria and beyond.

As one of our 4-H parents remarked, "It was impactful. Not having 35 pounds of trash on our sidewalks and roads makes a big difference." Another parent highlighted the educational aspect, noting, "I believe having the kids pick up trash raises their awareness of its presence. They often expressed curiosity, saying 'I wonder what this was' or 'I can't believe someone threw this away.' It helps them understand the impact of littering, whether it's tossing something out the window or dropping it on the ground, and also the impact of contributing to their community."

"PASS is an acronym for the steps to use a fire extinguisher: **Pull, Aim, Squeeze, and Sweep**. Most fire extinguishers can be used with the PASS method, which can help protect against small fires and fire-related injuries."

We were able to put what we learned to the test and use an extinguisher to put out a real fire.
