

Funding Sources

Our programs operate through a unique partnership between the County of Marin, the UC system, support from the USDA, and other private funds. Backed by the resources of the UC campuses, our educational programs use practically applied research information to solve community problems. We consult with individuals and organizations, publish newsletters, conduct local applied research, produce information for mass media, and conduct seminars and workshops. For every \$1 the county contributes, other sources contribute \$4.

Youth Development Program 🗢

LEADERSHIP AND COMMUNITY **PROJECTS** occupied the nine community clubs, the Halleck Creek disabled riding program and 4-H summer camp program, for 1,745 youth members and 166 adult leaders. A marine biology project was a highlight: 33 youth and 20 adults learned about nonnative species in Tomales Bay from scientists and completed the project with an overnight

"Sharks in the Dark" adventure at Marine World. Our clubs also participate in county-wide events like the Harvest Fair, Farm Day, the West Marin Fair, and the Marin County Fair. This March, 2,000 K-4 children and 1,000 adults were hosted at the Farm Day event cosponsored with the Marin County Fair and the Marin County Office of Education. Exit teacher evaluations indicate an 84% rating for outstanding exhibits. The 4-H



staff also does embryology projects in a variety of schools by providing supplies, curriculum, and support.

4-H is a member of the Marin County Children and Weight Coalition providing educational activities to improve nutrition and increase physical activity, partnering with Kaiser Permanente's Educational Theatre and others

Sudden Oak Death Coordination 🗢

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE to other counties, agencies, and the public continued this year, with outreach assistance to a number of groups, and presentations to more than 2,000 individ-



uals throughout the State. In Marin we hosted four sessions and provided information to 260 professionals, as well as providing support to homeowners through the Master Gardeners. We held two training sessions in the central coast area for 80 participants, and also

developed a national training session for Master Gardeners that reached over 730 people in 40 states. Work with California tribes greatly expanded this year due to a collaborative effort with the North Coast Resource Conservation and Development Council. We developed a "tribal toolkit" and "train-the-trainer" sessions for tribal elders and environmental staff and held three workshop sessions that reached approximately 60 people. During the spring semester, we hired an intern, Whitman College student Isaac Cunningham, to assist with an online survey of our outreach efforts. The survey generated a total of 302 responses from a variety of geographic regions and affiliations. Most responses came



Marin County Food Stamp Nutrition Education Program (FSNEP) provided curricular training to 64 teachers and classroom nutrition or garden activities to their 870 students. The age-appropriate UC curriculum integrates nutrition,

health, plant science, and gardening. Program representative Elsa Latini is also a Marin Master Gardener volunteer. She has helped establish gardens at schools, and provides teacher support by working on a regular basis with the teachers and their students at Bayside, Laurel Dell, San Pedro, and Bahia Vista elementary schools, and seven of the Community Action Marin childcare centers. This program year, Elsa also educated teachers about the Marin Food Systems Project and the Marin Agricultural Land Trust's Farm Field Studies program, and assisted in facilitating classroom visits to Marin County farms in an effort to provide a more complete picture of where their food comes from.

The children have an increased awareness and knowledge about where food comes from, and eating healthful food. They draw about their experiences in their journals, talk about nutrition at lunch, and their parents are excited about it! - Jennifer Banks, Bayside School

from the infested California counties and from the public sector (government/resource agencies). Forty-eight were from Marin County. The survey results indicate



that past outreach efforts have been well received, but there is still a need for more work, especially with supplying handouts and signage in park systems, in addition to providing more information to reduce misdiagnosis. Based on these results we created three new tools: a Spanish translation of important facts and management recommendations; a "By The Numbers" fact sheet; and a demonstration shoe cleaning kit

with instructions for use. This year also brought a consolidation of responsibilities within the California Oak Mortality Task Force, and we took over the management of the COMTF website as well as outreach coordination across the entire State.

Urban Horticulture Program 🗢

THE URBAN HORTICULTURE PROGRAM provides Integrated Pest Management information and education to the professional landscape industry. A total of 400 landscape pro-



the San Rafael Community Center on landscape irrigation and emerging IPM problems. A record 500 Marinites attended one of 28 fall and spring library series at seven Marin libraries. Topics ranged from soil building and composting to garden design. Another 2,170 residents attended workshops and clinic events taught by Master Gardener volunteers, while we handled 2,398 walk or

call-ins at our office in Novato. Retiring Horticulture Advisor Pavel Svihra was honored with a grove of trees named for him and a plaque at Novato's Josef Hoog Community Park. Said Carole Dillon-Knutson, a Novato Councilwoman, who studied under Svihra, "He provided the foundation for keeping Marin trees healthy and beautiful." Glenn Smith, our horticultural technician, is assisting the Master Gardener volunteer corps in servicing residents and commercial professionals until we are able to recruit a new advisor.

Sustainable Agriculture Program 🗢

THE "GROWN IN MARIN" program helps strengthen the viability and long-term success of agriculture in Marin by assisting farmers and ranchers with business and crop diversifi cation. Program Coordinator Steve Quirt organized three educational farm diversification workshops on dry farming, seed saving, and organic weed control. Eighty-three percent of those



ranchers attended a "Taking Charge of the Future" conference. Since then, one young rancher, Jolynn Mendoza, has started her own organic dairy.

Program Coordinator Steve Quirt publishes six newsletters per year that showcase successful diversification and organic transition examples. The Grown in Marin website (www.growninmarin.org) offers farm profiles and product availability, as well as historical information, resources, archived newsletters, and an events listing. Farmed organic acreage including pasture in Marin has increased from 357 acres in 2000 to over 11,000 in 2005. Organic production (includes livestock and crop produc

Marin Master Gardeners also led a series of habitat garden field trips for elementary classrooms in close collaboration

with the Marin Art & Garden Center wildlife sanctuary and garden education program. Two hundred Master Gardener volunteers donated a total of 13,013 hours of education and service valued at \$286,286 to Marin County at farmers' markets, library talks and clinics, and other

special events. Volunteers provided educational expertise and materials to 31 Marin schools with 2,890 children and 182 teacher participants.

Water Quality & Watershed Program 🗢

IMPROVING THE QUALITY of water in California's streams and rivers is a high priority. This is evidenced in Marin County by the ongoing attention to conditions in the Tomales Bay Watershed with the goal of providing suitable water quality for shellfish harvesting and recreational activities. We provide leadership towards this goal through research, science-based education, and community service This includes the on-farm evaluation of water-qualityimproving practices that area livestock ranchers and dairy farmers can apply in their stewardship of the watershed. The

Marin Resource Conservation District funded watershed advisor Dave Lewis and Michael Lennox to evaluate the benefits of creek fencing, filter strips and other practices to improve water quality on agricultural lands, Funds

were also provided by the State Water Resources Control Board to study bacterial dynamics at the fresh water stream and tidal zone area interface. Results from this research are shared through farm visits and educational events. The educational component of our program provides opportunity for producers, technical and financial assistance organizations, and regulatory agencies to access current research results on water



quality management. Improving water quality and watershed conditions is a multi-stakeholder process involving the resolution of diverse interests and the development of partnerships. Dave is the current chair of the Tomales Bay Watershed Council's

Water Quality Committee. The Committee has secured \$35,000 from Marin Community Foundation and Marin County, to conduct water quality monitoring in the Bay and tributary streams. This monitoring will generate localized information needed to make informed decisions on the locations and timing of further stewardship efforts.
