University of California trained and certified Master Gardener volunteers are avid home gardeners who work to promote environmentally responsible horticultural practices, including sharing information about maintaining healthy gardens to reducing fertilizer and pesticide pollutants, conserving water, composting green waste to reduce landfill and improving air quality by reducing burning of green waste.

**Our Demonstration Garden** is located on the grounds of the Nevada Irrigation District in Grass Valley at 1036 West Main Street. The garden features 1.5 acres with targeted growing areas, including:

Our all-volunteer organization has a very modest program budget of \$34K which affects our ability to be impactful in our community. Revenue is primarily generated by our Annual Plant Sale and Garden Guide sales, with no operating support coming from the UC system. Contributions are appreciated!

## **Accomplishments**



- ∀ 1986: MGNC started planting 5,000 daffodil bulbs along Highway 20/49 and continues to plant daffodil bulbs to beautify the community every fall, at the North Star House in 2022.
- ★ 1991: our Demonstration Garden, located on NID grounds, was established.
- ∀ 1992: the annual Spring Plant Sale was established, that financially supports MGNC's programs.
- ∀ 2020 2022: COVID necessitated the public plant sale to go on hiatus in 2020. In May 2022, our popular plant sale returned to the Demo Garden and was well attended by the public.
- ∀ 2022: After a pause due to COVID, MGNC engaged in a Strategic Planning process to re-invigorate the organization and to advance the community's understanding of research-based sustainable gardening practices.
- ∀ 2022 Fall: An Interpretive Signage Project for the Demo Garden was designed to increase visitor enjoyment through appreciation and understanding of sustainable gardening practices.
